THE REVOLT IN HERZEGOVINA.
It is rather curious that the first intelligence of important Turkish reverses in the Herzegovina should reach us from Constantinople, but there is on this account the less reason to doubt the truth of the reports. The Turks, it is said, have been defeated, after a three days' fight, and the siege of Trebigne has been renewed by the insurgents. The Herzegovinians cannot long withstand the power of Turkey, and this temporary success will be of little service to them unless the Servians and Montenegrins are encouraged by it to join in the revolt. The Servian Ministry were determined at the last accounts to maintain friendly relations with the Porte, and had sent out a circular to the chiefs of the different districts forbidding them to aid the insurgents in any way. The Prince of Montenegro has declared his intention to follow the policy of Servia, so that the prospects of the Herzegovinians are not very bright at present.

THE JAPANESE HAVE A NEW BRANCH OF COMMERCE.
They are shipping bricks to California and selling them cheaper than those made in that State, notwithstanding there is an ad valorem duty of twenty per cent. on them. The Japanese brick is 8 1/2 inches long, 4 1/2 inches wide, and 2 1/2 inches thick. The Southern Pacific Railway is rapidly progressing. They are working 310 hands at work, completing three quarters of a mile of grading a day. They began four miles above Alexandria, and are working each way. SENATOR GORDON ON CARPET-BAGGERS.
Under this caption the New York Herald condemns Senator Gordon for his denunciation of "carpet-baggers" in his late speech in Mississippi, and very strangely construes it into a sweeping attack upon all Northern men. The Northern press ought certainly to know by this time that the word "carpet-bagger" at the South is applied solely to political adventurers, who are among us only for the purpose of personal aggrandisement and gain by unprincipled use of the ignorant negro vote, and whose characters, like their worldly goods, can be packed away in an exceedingly small receptacle, and transported with ease and rapidity. These are the men denounced by Senator Gordon, and not honorable Northern men, who are welcomed to our midst.

GEN. JOSEPH E. JOHNSTON.
We clip from the New York Herald a very high compliment to this distinguished Confederate leader, called forth by the mistaken idea, that Gen. Johnston had accepted a foreign military position. The compliment, however, will bear publishing, and we give it to our readers. If the New York Herald had not been so careful in adding "on the Southern side," and candidly acknowledged what impartial foreign criticism avows, that Johnston is greater than any General produced on the Northern side during the war, its compliment would have been more appreciated, especially if unaccompanied by the insidious comparisons and reflections made by it, and which we have omitted.

MEME. ADELINA PATTI is now seeking repose at Dieppe, after the fatigues of her London season. While in London she sang in eight concerts, twenty-one operas, accepted forty invitations to dinner, and assisted at twenty-five balls. It is said that her facility for study has so greatly increased that she finds it possible to learn in a few weeks a role which others blunder over for months. She already knows thirty-four operas from beginning to end. When she is studying, her habit is not to sing aloud the role which she wishes to learn. She either reads or hums it. Even her accompanist often cannot hear her voice on these occasions. It is the same at rehearsals. Only at the last grand general rehearsal does she descend to sing with her full voice.

DEPARTING OF RECEIVING AN "OUTRAGE" reports through the Treasury Department, the Washington Republican has started a mill of its own. Its first gist is rather thin and light, but it makes the most of it. It publishes letters from unheard of correspondents announcing the outbreak of an insurrection in Mississippi on August 23, when "several negroes were killed and a dozen or more wounded." This definite and exclusive news moves the organ to this blood-curdling conclusion: "In short, it seems that the very spirit of rebellious intolerance has broken loose in the South, and that the procession of the approaching national contest has already aroused the Democracy of that section to the commission of outrages which disclose their true feelings toward the General Government."
