WASHINGTON.

A Defaulter—Postmaster's Suspension. WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—Postmaster Part of Boston, is here, as the President en route, and had a long interview with the Postmaster-General on the question of his suspension—Not decided.

Charles G. Fisher, late Assistant Federal District Attorney, committed in default of \$4,000 bail—charge stealing court records—penalty \$2,000 fine and three years hard labor, or both, at discretion of the court. He is a son of Judge Fisher, late United States District Attorney.

NEW YORK.

Destination from the Storm—Houston's Bondholders. NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—The following telegrams were received last evening by prominent merchants doing business with Texas:

Houston, Sept. 20.—The greatest distress prevails among the poor people at East End, Galveston. Several hundred persons have been rendered utterly destitute by the storm. They need help immediately.

A Committee of Relief has been organized to help the sufferers, with the Mayor of Galveston at its head. Contributions are now being received. Can you help them?

Galveston, Sept. 20.—Great suffering prevails here among the poorer classes, and many in the wealthier class are in distress. The people at East End have been washed out of their homes; their clothing lost, and provisions destroyed. Help is needed now.

A meeting of the bondholders of Houston, Texas, representing \$200,000, was held, to take action upon the non-payment of interest. Mr. Chew, Financial Agent, suggested a surrender of the bonds, and an acceptance of others, bearing six per cent. That this city could pay out ten per cent. was entirely out of the question. This being refused, no conclusion was reached.

MISSOURI.

Indianola, Texas, Almost Destroyed. St. Louis, Sept. 21.—Superintendent Cleary of the Western Union Telegraph Company, communicates to Gen. Anderson Steger as follows:

"A Morgan steamship has just arrived at Galveston and reports that the town of Indianola, Texas, as almost entirely destroyed. The light-houses, wharves, and nearly every house have been swept away, and one hundred to one hundred and fifty lives lost. The steamer could find no place to land her cargo."

ELECTRICISMS.

The Khan has accepted all conditions of peace from Russia.

Mr. Roxah, of Savannah, Ga., arrived in Concord, New Hampshire, and is reported to have the yellow fever.

Mechanics' Bank of Montreal, has suspended, in consequence of defalcations.

The Committee appointed to arrange for holding a National Railroad Convention in St. Louis, November 23d, has authorized the President to issue an address and appo at the necessary sub Committee.

It is stated that Carlisle General Sabala, with his two sons, has entered France.

Dr. Horatio Stone, the sculptor, is dead.

Marcus S. Hopkins, Examiner-in-chief Patent Office, has resigned.

A disease similar to the epidemic is prevailing in many towns in New York State. It seems to concentrate in the throat, causing much distress.

FOREIGN.

ENGLAND.

The Insurance at a Close. London, Sept. 21.—A special dispatch from Berlin to the Times says: "The Porte is endeavoring to impress on the foreign powers the necessity of fixing a date for the termination of the Consular mediation in the insurgent camps. The Turkish Government, in view of possible military requirements, has ordered the construction of the Sophia Nish and Banjaluka Railway to be pushed forward with the utmost despatch.

FRANCE.
