NEW HAMPSHIRE.

Outrage and Murder.
CONCORD, Oct. 5.—A young school girl was found half a mile from her home, with her throat cut. She had been outraged and murdered.

CONNECTICUT.

Town Elections.

HARTFORD, Oct. 5.—The town election on local questions was entered into largely. No very marked changes from last year noticed. The Republicans in this city elected a town clerk and first select man. The Democrats have elected the balance. The constitutional amendments making the gubernatorial term two years and changing the state elections from spring to fall was carried largely. The largest towns generally voted for license. The smaller ones are about equally divided.

The Transportation of Peaches—China.
LONDON, Oct. 5.—The experiment of bringing peaches per steamer Corolla from New York, in a box on deck arranged on the Allegretti refrigerating plan, was a success. They were the first delivered here in good condition and were eagerly purchased.

A special telegram from Shanghai says: A decree appeared in the Gazette at Peking, conceding heretofore the intercourse between the chiefs of government departments and foreign ministers.

ELIZABETH, Oct. 5.—David S. Perry, aged 75 years, was sentenced to 14 years for abortion.

NEW HAMPSHIRE.

Outrage and Murder.

CONCORD, Oct. 5.—A man named Drew was arrested at Pembroke for outraging and murdering a young girl. The mob is besieging the station house where Drew is confined. The head was discovered one hundred yards from where the body was found.

ARKANSAS.

Negro Insurrection—Convention.

HEMERA, Oct. 5.—The negroes threatened Friars Point to-day. Some whites from there reached here at two o'clock this morning. A number of men left here for Friars Point, and more are ready. A gentleman from Friars Point says that Brown, who is the colored sheriff and a candidate for re-election, came from Memphis last week and purchased considerable ammunition, which was taken to Friars Point and distributed among his friends. On Saturday night the Democratic Conservative Convention held their meeting and nominated their ticket in opposition to that headed by Brown. Senator Moore being present, he was called on for a speech. He criticized Brown's official conduct in a severe manner, and Brown who was present, became very much excited and demanded the privilege of replying, but Mr. Biz, the chairman, fearing bloodshed adjourned the meeting. Brown then announced that he would call the meeting on Monday night. The supposed trouble grew out of this meeting last night.

VIRGINIA.

Chesapeake & Ohio R.R.—Lottery Fraud

RICHMOND, Oct. 5.—A bill of foreclosure was granted against the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad on the first mortgage, was filed yesterday in the United States Court for this district. An identical bill has also been filed at Parkersburg, West Virginia. An order preliminary to a receivership together with an injunction restraining any interference with the mortgaged property pending the proceedings, has been issued by Judge Bond. Upon the entry of the decree of sale, all parties interested in the road will unite in the purchase of the line and franchise, paying therefore with the same securities they now hold. The judgment will clear off all existing liens on the property and enable the corporation to obtain additional capital to complete the operations with the road.

ALEXANDRIA, Oct. 5.—The holder of the ticket drawing the \$50,000 prize, presented it to-day, but there was no money. The holder claims he owns some silver lands in Montana and was in New York to dispose of his lands, when he was induced to buy \$200 worth of tickets. He says he knows where \$50,000 worth of bonds belonging to the lottery are deposited and has to send to his agent to attach them.

The United States vs. Lewis, Trustee.
PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 5.—In the United States Court, the opinion of Justice Strong in the United States vs. Lewis, Trustee of Jay Cooke & Co., read at the time of the government, and at the time of the bankruptcy was indebted to the government 132,610 pounds and the creditors and that the assets in the hands of the trustee should first be applied to discharge this indebtedness. Justice Strong sustains the claims of the government, and the chances are in its favor. The decision was passed upon the fact that J. Cooke & Co., were partners of Jay Cooke, McCullagh & Co.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—The State Department has been encouraging advice from Mexico in reference to the contributions of that country to the centennial.
