NORTH CAROLINA.

State Convention—State Fair.

RALPH, Oct. 11.—The State Convention adjourned sine die, after a session of 31 working days. In the last few days of the session, many important ordinances were passed, amounting to a general emancipation of the Legislature from the restrictions under which it has labored since 1868, and giving it larger powers. The public debt question was not interfered with. Several important attempts have been made to repudiate the special tax bonds.

The State fair commenced to-day and the hotels are rapidly filling up with visitors. From present indications the fair will be a grand success as larger quantities of machinery are on exhibition than ever before, while the stock department is well represented. Large numbers of good horses are entered for racing and trotting.

WISCONSIN.

Revenue Seizure.

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 10.—The property of J. P. Kissinger, of this city, was yesterday seized by revenue officials for an assessment of \$236.00 against the Union Copper Distilling Company, of which he is a stockholder.

VIRGINIA.

Receiver Appointed.

RICHMOND, Oct. 10.—Judge Bond of the United States Circuit Court has appointed Henry Lyson, Esq., of Baltimore, receiver of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad, under the application of creditors for a foreclosure of the first mortgage. Gen. W. C. Wickham, Vice-President, has issued orders to all agents of the road in conformity with the appointment.

WASHINGTON.

The Sioux Indians.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—The agents of the Sioux Indians have been instructed by the Interior Department not to issue annuities belonging to their respective agencies unless they (the Indians) have been counted. The agents are also instructed to hold the Indians to their requirements, even if they are not paid their annuities until the latter part of spring.

NEW YORK.

Heavy Fallures.

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—W. P. Roberts, flour and grain merchant, has made an assignment. The failure was the result of heavy advances on grain. Liabilities very heavy.

A. S. Hermans, dealer in woolsens, has also made an assignment.

The firm of Geo. Reichenburg & Co., cotton brokers, yesterday announced their inability to meet engagements. Liabilities not stated.

Riotous Disturbances.

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 10.—There was considerable shooting at Shenandoah last night, and at one time there were fears of riotous disturbances.

Two men were wounded, one slightly and the other severely.

A dispatch states that over a hundred shots were fired at the officers who attempted to make arrests.

At Mahony City a number of incendiary fires occurred.

The sheriff has issued a proclamation calling on all gangs and bodies of men to disperse and go to their homes.

Fatal Prize Fight—Fire.

NEW YORK.

Additional Arrests—Collision.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—Three additional arrests have been made in the case of the murder of James H. Doe. A man who was with Dolan, the alleged murderer, on the day of the tragedy, a woman with whom he had been on the night before and a man who had been in his company after the murder. The woman confessed that Dolan and his associate from Webster quit her on that Sunday morning at four o'clock. Dolan was the man who wore the light grey coat that was so accurately described by Mr. Doe. He returned at half-past nine with his coat collar turned up, his face scratched and bleeding, his shirt front bedaubed with blood and his vest torn. He was greatly excited when he retired to bed and awoke every few minutes. The woman at once entered his room with the third man. Dolan, in his feverish sleep, had thrown the pillow on the floor, and his head lay between Mr. Doe's good watch and the pocketbook. The woman, startled by his fright, threw herself upon him and exclaimed, "Oh John, John, you have killed some one." Dolan sprang out of bed and implored them to say nothing about it and gave the woman five dollars and fifty cents of the money taken from Mr. Doe, to buy him a shirt. On her return his associate had got rid of the bloody garment.

An unknown schooner ran into and sank the coal barge N. L. Lee, off the battery on Saturday night. Captain Cooper's wife and child who were asleep in the cabin, went down with the barge and were drowned.

The human line steamer, City of Berlin, arrived at Queens town to-day, having made the trip in seven days fifteen hours and forty-eight minutes. This is the fastest time on record from port to port.

The legality of the transfer in December last, of the Little Rock & Fort Smith Railroad and lands, is about to be contested by the old bondholders.

LONG ISLAND.

Riot and Assault and Battery.

HUNTSBROOK, Oct. 11.—The case of the People against Geo. B. Banks and Royal Sammis, indicted by the Grand Jury for riot and assault and battery, will be tried this week at Riverhead. This is a case growing out of the disappearance of young Kelsey, which led to the belief that he had been murdered by the lynchers.

CONNECTICUT.

Explosion.

BANDONNET, Oct. 11.—The boiler in John C. Mackay's hat factory exploded to-day killing the engineer.

PENNSYLVANIA.

All quiet at Shenandoah—Church Suit.

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 11.—There is no disturbance at Shenandoah as was apprehended. The man John who was wounded on last Saturday night, is still alive.

The long contested church case growing out of the suspension in 1868, of Geo. H. Stuart, Esq., of this city, by Gen. Synod, of the Reformed Presbytery, for singing hymns and communicating with other churches, was finally settled to-day by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, at Pittsburgh, in favor of the Stuart party. The particulars of the case which has been decided was the suit against the Fifth Reformed Presbyterian church of this city, Rev. Dr. McAuley, to eject them from their church property. By this decision they retain their property. The opinion of the court was read by Judge Gordon and is one of the most important church decisions ever given in this country. The principles involved in this case will determine the suit pending against the First Reformed Presbyterian Church.

CALIFORNIA.

Destructive Fire.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11.—The hoisting works at the Utah mine, Virginia City, were burned to-day. The loss is estimated at a quarter of a million of dollars. The shaft is two thousand feet deep. The engineer hoisted out miners until badly burned, when he had to abandon the engine. The balance of the miners escaped through the old shaft.

WASHINGTON.

Supreme Court.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—The following gentlemen were admitted to practice in the Supreme Court: Wm. U. Garrard, Savannah, Henry J. Levy and Armand Pilot, New Orleans. The Supreme Court will commence to call the docket to-morrow, under the 26th rule. The Attorney General decides that Cowan cannot legally exercise his functions as Secretary of the Interior, after to-day. There are 638 cases on the Supreme Court docket.

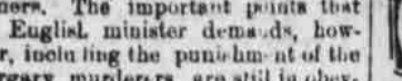
