Ohio Goes Republican by a Small Majority—Nebraska Goes Republican by 88 Majority—Iowa Gives Kirkwood a Majority of 35,000.

NORTH CAROLINA.

Raleigh, Oct. 12.—The State Fair is a success. The exhibition is large, especially in the stock and machinery departments. The crowd will be very large to-morrow and Thursday. A citizens' purse of \$5,000 is offered, and the race will commence to-morrow. The entries are large.

OHIO.

The Gubernatorial Chair. Cincinnati, Oct. 12.—There were over 20,000 voters polled in this city before 11 o'clock this morning. No complete returns from any ward have yet been received.

The election passed off quietly. The Republicans claim the county for Hayes, and the entire county ticket. It is certain that the Republicans have made large gains. The result in the city will not be known until late.

Toledo, Oct. 12.—The election today has been quiet, with a full vote, and considerable scattering on both sides. The returns from the city are slow. Nothing is expected before midnight, and some wards cannot be counted before noon to-morrow.

New York, Oct. 12.—A private dispatch from Cincinnati, dated 8:30 tonight, says: "It is estimated that the vote of the State will reach 500,000. As far as heard from, the Republican gain in every county, except Mahoning and possibly Franklin, Cuyahoga county is said to have given 3,000 Republican majority."

[Later.]—The returns from a number of the northwestern counties, mostly mining districts, give the Democrats gains.

STILL LATER.

Columbus, Oct. 12.—Returns from 300 townships and wards give Hayes (Rep.) at least 6,000 majority.

NEBRASKA.

Omaha, Oct. 12.—In Hall county, the entire Republican State ticket was elected. The Judicial ticket throughout the State was elected by 88 majority.

IOWA.

Dix Marks, Oct. 12—Up to 11:30 P. M. indicate a Rep. gain of 15 per cent. over the majority of the same in 1874. The estimated gain for Kirkwood (candidate for Rep. Gov.) is 35,000.

NEW YORK.

Americans Dueling Near Paris—Cigar Bands Other than Iron Branding.

New York, Oct. 12.—A Paris Herald special says: "A duel was fought with swords at Neuilly, near Paris, yesterday, between two young Americans named respectively, Biggs and Paine. The cause of the duel was an old family vendetta, which was removed last Thursday night in Renaissance theatre. Blows were exchanged before the audience and the police had to interfere. The result of the duel was, that Paine got wounded slightly in the arm."

GEORGIA.

State Fair—Stephen's Recovery. Macon, Oct. 12.—The exhibition of live stock and machinery at the State Fair, to be held here on the 18th will be unusually large and fine, as the entries are rapidly coming in. General Hawley, President of the Centennial Commission and Senator Hayard, of Delaware, are to speak on the fair grounds on Tuesday, the 19th.

AUGUSTA, Oct. 12.—Alexander H. Stephens has been relieved and is considered out of danger.

WASHINGTON.

At Home Again. Washington, Oct. 12.—President Grant leaves Chicago to-day, direct for Washington.

ALABAMA.

The State Grange Fair. Salem, Oct. 12.—The first annual fair of the state grange of Alabama, commenced at Salem, October 26th, and continues five days. There are seven hundred and fifty grangers in Alabama, that will be represented, and the people in every section are moving to make it a success. Prominent speakers from the north, east, south and west are expected, and the fair promises to be the grandest ever held in the state. The people of Salem have made ample preparations for guests, and the railroads are to issue half-rate tickets.

MARYLAND.

Suicide. Baltimore, Oct. 12.—An unknown man, thirty years old threw himself from the Washington monument which is 180 feet high, and was crushed into a shapeless mass. A note was found in his pocket which read: "Now Miss Cobb I leave thee, in these woe am still, forever, still, forever, farewell. Even though unforgiving you never again shall my heart rebel."

TENNESSEE.

Memphis, Oct. 12.—Heavy frost and thin ice are formed on exposed places, but it is not believed that any serious damage is done to the cotton crop.

PENNSYLVANIA.

BLOWN DOWN. Philadelphia, Oct. 12.—The agricultural hall, at the centennial grounds, was blown down and eight laborers injured, five seriously, and one dead.

FOREIGN.

ITALY. Vienna, Oct. 12.—All the European powers, except France, have exchanged ideas regarding the financial situation and policy of Turkey. They see no grounds for remonstrance.

GERMANY.

Berlin, Oct. 12.—The Turks have seized a quantity of gunpowder that was sent to Crete by the Greek revolutionary committee.

ENGLAND.

LONDON, Oct. 12.—The morning Post, to-day, asserted that Holland has sent five men to war to the Caribbean sea. The Liberator consult here, give accounts of the war with the neighboring savages as having five engagements. The Liberator were victorious.

CANADA.

Collingwood, Oct. 12.—Over six inches of snow fell here last night. Considerable damage was done to trees and ornamental trees by the heavy weight of snow, breaking and bending them to the ground. Snow is still falling this morning.
