OHIO.

Republican Victories.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 13.—The official returns from eighteen wards and precincts in Hamilton county, gives Hayes 4,834 and Allen 4,345. The whole Republican county ticket is probably elected.

71 of the 85 precincts in Hamilton county, gave Hayes 918 majority. 61 precincts give Young, the Republican candidate for Lieutenant Governor, 2,800 majority over Cary. The Republicans elect three Legislators on an average majority of 7,000. Hayes's majority in Hamilton county will reach 1,500.

The returns from 565 precincts, nearly one-third the state, show a Republican gain of 5,400.

COLUMBUS, Oct. 13.—The Democrats concede the state to the Republicans by 15,000 majority and a fair majority in both branches of the General Assembly.

TOLEDO, Oct. 13.—Lucas county, with one township to hear from, gives Hayes 7,743 and Allen 4,433.

DATTON, Oct. 13.—Montgomery county, gives Allen 822 majority, Cary 579.

NEBRASKA.

Republican Majority.

OMAHA, Oct. 12.—The Republican state ticket is probably elected. Dodge county strongly Democratic. The new constitution was carried by a large majority.

IOWA.

50,000 Majority.

Des Moines, Oct. 12.—The returns reported by the State Register indicate a majority of at least 30,000.

ILLINOIS.

Kirkwood Elected.

CHICAGO, Oct. 13.—The returns from Iowa up to this time show a Republican victory in nearly every county and in most cases, a very considerable Republican gain. A large vote has been polled and the local tickets are badly scratched in a number of places. Gen. Kirkwood is elected by a large majority, and the Legislature will have an increased number of Republican members.

NEW YORK.

Declined the Nomination—Chesapeake & Ohio R. R.—Failure—W. H. T. C.

New York, Oct. 13.—General W. F. Bartlett has declined the Democratic nomination for Lieutenant Governor of Massachusetts.

Between 2 o'clock on Monday and three yesterday afternoon the holders of \$23,000,000 worth of the bonds and stock certificates of the industries of the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad, had called at Fisk & Hatch's office and stipulated to assist in an effort to arrest the receiver appointed by Judge Bond, of Virginia. Of the \$12,000 indebtedness of the road, nearly \$10,000,000 are held in this vicinity.

The liabilities of Wm. B. Hunter & Co., tea importers and Canadian commission merchants are \$50,000. There will be a meeting of the creditors to day.

The following is a synopsis of the annual report of President Ordron, for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1875, which was presented to day to the stockholders of the Western Union Telegraph Company. The gross receipts for the year from all sources, except the proceeds of the bonds, were \$955,457,460. The gross expenses were \$633,541,467. The difference, \$222,915,985 being the net profit. The bond debt of the Company July 1st, 1874, was \$5,946,900, of which \$1,498,000 in the seven per cent, gold bearing bonds and \$4,448,900 the seven per cent, currency bonds which mature Nov. 1st, 1875. The annual election of the directors of the Western Union Telegraph Company was held to day, at which the old board was re-elected with the addition of John Duff, of Boston, in place of Geo. H. Mumford, deceased.
