OHIO.

Election Returns.

Correspondent Oct. 15.—Neither Repub-

lican nor Democratic Committee have

received any additional returns this

morning. The Senate is still doubtful.

The Senate cannot be determined until

the new returns are received from

Wood county when it is reported the

counting was delayed by insufficient

votes polled.

LATER.—The news just received

from Wood county, claims that heavy

frauds were practiced in Perryville

which will probably necessitate the

throwing out of many votes polled

there. If this vote is counted Hayes'

majority in the county will be 400 and

this elects one Republican Senator, if

thrown out Hayes' majority in that

county will be 7,234 and both Repub-

lican Senators elected. In either case

a Republican representative is elected

which gives the S. seat to the Repub-

licans by two majority and the House

by twelve majority. Hayes' majority

will probably now be over four thou-

sands.

WASHINGTON.

The Mississippi Trouble Ended.

Washington, Oct. 15.—The follow-

ing was received here to day:

JACKSON, Oct. 14.

To the Hon. H. R. Pease, Washington.

The military operations have been

concluded by Gen. Ames, and based

upon the most full, ample and minute

assurances of the leading citizens of

the State that there shall be peace and

a fair and free election. They would

not undertake to answer for the insurrec-

tion, but they guarantee aid to the civil

authorities in the execution of the laws. The

Governor expresses himself wholly

satisfied with the assurances given, and

believes that they are made in good

faith, and will be carried out to the

letter. An improved feeling prevails,

especially among the whites, and a

general desire for peace prevails among

all classes of goodness.

LOUISIANA.

Arrested on Suspicion—Shot—Hang.

BATON ROUGE, Oct. 14.—Gov. Auture Williams and John Gair were arrested here yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Woodard, charged with accessory in the poisoning of J. W. Sanders. They were taken by a Deputy Sheriff and a posse towards Clinton. Reporters here say Jno. Gair was shot to death on the road and his sister-in-law hung in the Court House square there. Mr. Gair is here and is not disturbed, Signed, Henry Seelover, Mayor.

SPAIN.

The Spanish Note to the Vatican.

MADRID, Oct. 15.—The Epoch of this city has an editorial article explanatory of the note recently sent to the vatican. The note, the Epoch says, points to the religious condition of Europe and makes the deduction that Spain cannot be exceptional. It expressed a wish to negotiate for the modification of some of the articles of the concordat of 1851 which can never be executed.

The Spanish note to the vatican conservative ministry, explains that they were defeated. The note asks the vatican's consent to a settlement on a broad a base as possible.

ENGLAND.

Heavy Gales.

LONDON, Oct. 15.—There were heavy gales around the coasts of Great Britain yesterday. The telegraph has already announced the wreck of several coasters and the loss of a number of lives.

TURKEY.

Insurgents Defeated.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 15.—The following news is official: A force of 2,000 insurgents have been defeated by the Turks. 160 were killed and the rest took refuge in Montenegro. Several villages hitherto strongly insurgent have submitted to the Turkish authority.
