WASHINGTON.

Treasury Department—Senator Pease.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—The bonds held by the Treasury as security for bank circulation, is \$868,857,212, and for deposits of public money \$16,782,200; national bank notes received for redemption during the week \$3,381,965; national bank notes outstanding \$346,813,768, of which \$2,640,000 are in national gold bank notes. The custom receipts to-day were \$56,922,766; for the month \$70,887,380; for the fiscal year \$50,396,712 80; internal revenue receipts to-day \$31,645,433; for the month \$320,258,547; for the fiscal year \$3,373,179,118. The legal tender shipments during the week were \$3,750,000.

Ex Senator Pease had a long interview today with the President on the subject of the Mississippi troubles including the causes of the difficulties; the present condition of affairs and the remedies. The President talked freely and said he was much gratified that the two political parties had effected an amiable adjustment by which a fair election would be held and peace maintained in the state.

Efforts have heretofore been made by Senator Bruce and his friends for the removal of four federal officers in Mississippi, but Mr. Pease has assurances that no removals would be made in that State for mere partisan reasons. Attorney Gen. Pierrepont assured him that none coming under his department would be disturbed.

The Postmaster General has directed in compliance with a request of postmaster Filley, of St. Louis, that arrangements be made for a scheme for a fast mail service between New York, St. Louis and the Southwest made prior of all such matter as naturally belongs to the Pennsylvania Railroad, and ordered it to be sent by that line instead of the New York Central and Lake Shore route. This new arrangement will save to the department an expense of an unnecessarily long haul and insure quicker delivery of mails between the east, south-west and points on or near the line between St. Louis and Pittsburgh to which closed pouches are sent. It will also in a measure alleviate the inconveniences and delays now caused by the lack of postal railway car service between Pittsburgh and St. Louis. The Post Master General says he views this matter in a business light and desires justice done to all.

In a single night and for the purpose of robbery, a whole family consisting of an aged man, a

millionaire, named Francis De Lescar, his son-in-law, Mons Cartier and his wife and two sons and a daughter, and one Folgant, the keeper of their villa, were foully murdered on the morning of the fifth or late in the night of the fourth inst., at Mr. De L. Ecales mansion, situated about half a mile outside of the town of St. Pierre. Mr. De L. Ecales never had the sum of £100 of depositing his money in banks and it is therefore certain that the burglars and assassins have secured an enormous booty.
