FOREIGN.

GERMANY.

MUNICH, Oct. 28.—The Bavarian Chamber will be convened early in January and adjourned unless the cause of a deadlock by rejecting the Government financial bills.

BERLIN, Oct. 28.—It is definitely settled that Prince Frederick William, accompanied by his oldest son, will visit the Centennial.

The Council of Physicians acting in behalf of the Supreme Court, decides that Von Arnim can't bear the prolonged imprisonment to which he is sentenced.

FRANCE.

Gambetta's Manifesto. Paris, Oct. 28.—Gambetta publishes the following manifesto: I am confident the approaching election will show a great Republican majority, which upholds the system of Deputies of the voting. Among the labors of the future Assembly must be the restoration & control of education by the State.

CANADA.

Grange. Toronto, Oct. 28.—The Dominion Grange of the Patron of Husbandry has 257 subordinate granges in the Dominion. Senator Patterson is urging the matter.

SOUTH AFRICA.

Washington, Oct. 28.—Arrangements are in progress for the last mail from Washington to New Orleans, and will pass through Danville, Charlotte and Atlanta, and will save seven and a half hours between Washington and Columbia. Senator Patterson is urging the matter.

JUDGES.

H. Cowell, of Connecticut, has been appointed chief clerk of the postoffice department.

NEW YORK.

Convention Explosion. New York, Oct. 28.—The annual convention of the Railroad Conductors' Life Insurance Association report that twenty members have died and \$26,643 were paid to their heirs. The present membership is 1,654; receipts for the year, \$13,455; expenditures, \$13,178; balance on hand, \$237.

MIDDLEBURY, Oct. 28.—The skeleton of a man whom would stand about 11 feet high, was exhumed near Circleville, Orange county.

New York, Oct. 28.—A dispatch from Richmond says the explosion in the Raccoon coal pit, Chesterfield county, killed Davis, Smith, Conroy and Tufteiler. The bodies were burned beyond recognition.

The House of the Bishop's Protestant Episcopal Church has convened. There were thirty Bishops present. Bishop Smith presided. The object of the session is the creation of Bishops for China and Africa.

NEVADA.

The Fire. Virginia City, Oct. 28.—The best business men estimate the loss at seven millions, and a half a million as one-third of the insurance in foreign companies. A large number of women are being sent to the adjacent places, and safes are being pulled out. The vaults of the Bank of California are safe.

TENNESSEE.

Earthquake. Memphis, Oct. 28.—The earthquake last night caused considerable alarm in different parts of the city. Three shocks in rapid succession made the windows and crockery rattle, especially in the upper stories, and in some instances caused a stampede to the streets.

Murder and Suicide. St. Louis, Oct. 28.—D. R. Frazier, aged 21, was forbidden by his mother visiting friends, Pochman, aged 16. Visited the house, shot her in the breast and stabbed himself fatally. The young people were engaged.
