**Smuggling Decision - Great Scandal.**  
New York, Nov. 5.—It is announced that the Spanish Government has forwarded to their agents in this city orders to buy up and ship at once provisions and ammunition to the amount of \$400,000. The money for this purpose was contributed in Havana on the 20th ult., upon receipt of telegrams from Madrid, to the effect that American intervention was feared, and that all that could be done to deter it was advisable.

Several deputy marshals, after being driven off once, succeeded in capturing an illicit still in full operation in Brooklyn.

Judge Benedict decided the motion to quash the criminal indictment against H. B. Claflin & Co., for complicity in the silk smuggling frauds. The indictment contains four counts: 1st.—That of concealing smuggled goods. 2d.—Facilitating their transportation. 3d.—Facilitating their sale. The 4th count of the indictment makes general allegations of violation of the laws. As this was vague and cannot be sustained, and therefore the motion as to this count is granted, but as to the other three counts the motion to quash is denied, and the indictment is sustained.

A meeting of the members of Plymouth Church on the case of Mrs. P. D. Moulton and Deacon West, who have been notified by the Executive Committee of their intention to drop them from membership, for non-attendance. Deacon West was not present. Mrs. Moulton was present, attended by her attorney, Mr. Prior. Sixty members of the church were present, half of whom were ladies. Mr. Prior read the answer, written and signed by Mrs. Moulton, concluding as follows: "My absence is an enforced one, and is caused by the crime of adultery committed by Henry Ward Beecher, pastor of the church, with one of his parishioners, which I know to be a fact, through Mr. Beecher's confession to me, and through the confession of Mrs. Tilton, and through the conclusive evidence of the crime from other sources. I appear before this church in loyal obedience to the summons which I have received, and I hereby declare my disposition and desire to discharge all the duties devolving on me as a member, and that are consistent with my knowledge of the adultery of the pastor, and his false swearing in regard to it."

A silent vote was then taken and the name of Mrs. Moulton was dropped from the Plymouth roll of membership. It is stated there has been a committee appointed by the Congressional Association of New York and Brooklyn to inquire into the truth or falsity of the charges against Beecher. This Committee will commence business at once.

**WASHINGTON.**  
**Fire - Whiskey Frauds - Awards.**

Washington, Nov. 5.—A fire this morning destroyed three houses, burning three children to death. All colored.

The Attorney General has a dispatch stating that District Attorney Wells, the Administration candidate, has been elected to Congress from Mississippi, by a 3,000 majority.

The Attorney General has no objection to the indictment of Gen. Babcock and Orville Grant at St. Louis. General Babcock remarked that he did not care to take any notice of the report unless it should be verified.

**WASHINGTON.**  
**Fire - Whiskey Frauds - Awards.**

The Star says Gen. Babcock, private secretary to the President, says, with reference to the special dispatch from St. Louis to the Cincinnati Enquirer, stating that he has been indicted by the Grand Jury at St. Louis for conspiracy with the distillers of that city to defraud the Government out of the tax on "crooked" whiskey, that he does not believe that any indictment has been found against him for several reasons.

of citizens of the United States against Spain, for wrongs and injuries committed on their persons and property in the Island of Cuba, since the commencement of the present insurrection, has returned the following cases submitted to him by the arbitrators, with his decision and awards thereon: **Joaquin G. de Angerico**—The Spanish authorities were duly notified of the American citizenship of the claimant six months before lying an embargo upon his property, and have acknowledged his innocence of any complicity in the insurrection. The property was taken in 1869, and not restored to him before 1873 or '74. The Spanish authorities are liable for the unjust detention of it, and for the injury it sustained while in their possession. The empire awards the sum of \$748,180, with interest from the date of the decision until paid, at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum. Pedro S. Laiter.—No damage can be awarded claimant for injuries he received in a private quarrel. The proofs do not show that he was guilty of any offense, or that there was shown sufficient cause for arresting him. He was entitled to a trial before a competent court, and was released from imprisonment only after a detention of sixteen days. \$3,000 damages, with 6 per cent. interest from Sept. 1, 1870, to the day of payment, are awarded. C. Zamora.—Discontinued for want of jurisdiction.

**OHIO.**  
**Strike-Indictments.**  
COLUMBUS, Nov. 5.—Most of the miners of the Hooking Valley Mines have struck for an increase of 10 cents per ton.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 5.—A special dispatch to the Enquirer from St. Louis says, "the announcement is made that United States grand jury have found indictments against ex-District Attorney Patrick, ex-U. S. Marshal Krum, C. A. Newcomb, Orville Grant, brother of the President, Gen. Babcock, the President's private secretary, and others. The greatest excitement prevails. The indictments charge them with conspiracy with St. Louis distillers to defraud the Government out of the taxes on an immense amount of "crooked" whiskey. The indictments grow out of the testimony before the grand jury of Jas. M. Fitzroy, late Deputy U. S. Collector. Fitzroy was indicted by the previous grand jury and lately pleaded guilty to the charges against him. He is said to have been the treasurer of the St. Louis whiskey ring—the most gigantic combination ever organized to defraud the Government.

**MISSOURI.**  
**Election News.**  
KANSAS CITY, Nov. 5.—The Times has returns from 76 of the 103 Legislative districts in Kansas, which show the election of thirty-six straight republicans, and thirty-seven opposition, classified under the head of Democrats, Independents and Reformers. Last year only twenty-six members went to the opposition caucus, showing that the contest had been considerably closer than that. The Democrats also elect a Senator to fill a vacancy, and a District Judge in the Fort Scott District.

**IOWA.**  
**Pork-Packers Convention.**  
KEOKUK, Nov. 5.—Adjourned meeting of the Pork-packers Convention. A resolution in favor of a discontinuance of buying on commission, and proposing a deduction for unmerchantable hogs. Reports from delegates from different sections indicate the crop will be as good as last year. No serious returns are apprehended from the hog cholera.

**WISCONSIN.**  
**Election News.**  
MILWAUKEE, Nov. 5.—Returns from remote towns are very unfavorable to the Republicans, but will require an official count to determine the result. Ludington is probably elected by one thousand majority.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 5.—McGrath, the counterfeiter, was arrested to-day on board the steamer Indiana. He had engaged his passage to Europe.

VIENNA, Nov. 5.—The Neue Presse says Ignatieff, Russian Minister at Constantinople, has had an interview with the Grand Vizier, in which he threatened an armed intervention of the great Powers if the Turkish prosecution of Christians continues.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—The Daily News has a special telegram from Alexandria saying that the inhabitants of Kaka, on the White Nile, have revolted and defeated the Egyptian troops, killing one hundred. The Government has dispatched its forces to suppress the disturbance.
