SUNDAY'S DISPATCHES.
MISSOURI.

St. Louis, Nov. 7.—Col. E. R. Chapman, head of the Stamp Bureau at Washington, who with Gen. Lucius Hawley made the investigation which resulted in the seizure of distilleries and rectifying houses here during the past summer, has arrived here to assist in preparing the whiskey cases which are to come up during the next term of the U. S. Court. Through many of the accused have put in a plea of guilty, it is still necessary to put in a certain amount of evidence so as to enable the Judge to intelligently sentence the culprits. Col. Chapman states that any amount of testimony is in the hands of the Government—more than will be necessary to produce, especially in cases in which the accused has pleaded guilty. It is also stated that overtures have been made in Washington in behalf of some of the guilty, offering a surrender of all they possess, on condition that the Government will not press the criminal part of the proceedings. These overtures, it is asserted, have been received with no disposition to consider them. The Grand Jury adjourned this noon until Monday, without presenting any new documents.

ILLINOIS.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—Mr. H. Osterberg denies that the N. W. R. R. Co. has purchased of him the Rockford & Rock Island & St. Louis R. R. He says he is determined to run the latter road in the interest of the German bondholders whom he represents. Mr. Osterberg starts to-morrow for Rock Island bearing with him an order from the Court directing the Receiver to turn over to him the property of the road.

WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Arrangements have been perfected by the Postoffice Department for the arrival here of the New York mails in time for distribution by 1 P. M.

Since the publication of the general dispatch last Monday, stating the position of this Government toward Spain on the subject of Cuba, as expressed in former instructions to Minister Cushing, numerous inquiries have been made in official and other quarters for further information on the subject. Some of the inquiries were apprehensive that measures of a hostile character were meditated, but for this there was no foundation, as the matter is merely one of diplomacy.

MONDAY'S DISPATCHES.

WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—A \$5 counterfeit note purporting to be issued by the First National Bank of Galena, has been discovered in the Treasury. There is no such bank.

The President left here this morning on a brief tour to New York.

The Attorney-General says that official reports to him entirely exonerate Babeck and Orville Grant from the charges upon which they have been indicted for whiskey frauds.

Ex-Secretary D. Iano was at the Interior Department to-day, for the purpose of executing certain papers requisite for the formal transfer to Secretary Chandler of the guardianship of the various Indian trust funds.

A private dispatch received here this morning announces the total loss of the steamship Pacific, between Portland, Oregon, and San Francisco, by foundering at sea last Thursday. The dispatch says all on board were lost.

NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Henry A. Mann, for fifteen years Treasurer of Saratoga county, has defaulted, having illegally issued \$140,000 worth of county bonds during the past two years, nearly all of which were negotiated for in New York. He will be proceeded against for forgery.

Rome, Nov. 7.—It is reported that the French and Italian Envoys to Italy are soon to be raised to the rank of Ambassadors.
