VIRGINIA.

NORFOLK, November 12.—Maj. Gen. W. Gries, President of the Raleigh & Gaston Railroad, died suddenly at his residence in Portsmouth this morning of apoplexy.

WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Commissioner Horace Welsh as Postmaster, Marshall, Texas.

Several Treasury officials have been summoned to St. Louis to testify in whiskey fraud trials.

Wilson continues to improve.

The loans and discounts of the First National Bank for October amounted to over \$900,000,000. They held \$8,000,000 in specie, and \$75,000,000 legal tender, the facilities of which amount \$900,000,000 to the departmental annual dividends, \$6,000,000 other undivided profits, \$3,000,000 capital stock paid in \$504,000,000.

Hiram Ledding will be appointed Marshal for the Eastern District of Missouri, which includes St. Louis.

G. Wiley Wells, U. S. District Attorney for Northern Mississippi, is here to make his report and resign.

Two agents sent to Mississippi by the Department of Justice are preparing reports.

The change of U. S. Marshal for Missouri in the present stage of whisky prosecutions creates surprise.

Melvin D. Peck has been appointed Chief Clerk in the patent office.

The Commissioners of the Land Office will recommend that all timbered lands belonging to the Government be appraised, and put on the market at the appraised value.

The President recognized Regon Bianco, the new Italian Minister with usual speeches.

NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Smallpox prevails in an alarming extent in the sixteenth ward of Brooklyn, and vaccination is in active progress, although much opposition thereto is manifested by the inhabitants of the infected section, who are mostly Germans. The police arrested a German lager beer dealer yesterday for secreting three persons sick with smallpox in a room adjoining his shop, which was kept open and beer served to customers by his barkeeper.

The sanitary police in their rounds found most of the population engaged in manufacturing clothing, and were working on garments while some of the family lay sick with smallpox in the same apartment.

In the United States District Court to-day the Trustee in bankruptcy of Henry Clews & Co. filed a bill in equity asking that his rights as trustee be protected against Mr. Loomis, member of the firm of Batterfield & Co. Clews & Co. have a large claim against Batterfield & Co., and Mr. Loomis is owing the latter party for almost their entire assets, hence Mr. Tappan asks that his claim may be protected.

The Board of missions have made the following appropriations: Texas Conference, \$5,000; Western Texas, \$6,000; Virginia, \$7,500; Washington, \$3,500; Western Virginia, \$4,500; Wilmington, \$3,000. A resolution was adopted recommending the removal of the seat of the General Conference from St. Louis to Baltimore.

Dr. Theodore W. Evans, well known American dentist in Paris, sends the following cable dispatch to the associates:
