It is estimated that in 420 years more America will be without fuel. A good many of us will be dead by that time, and will have no cause to complain of lack of heat.—*Detroit Free Press*.

The Constitutional Convention of North Carolina met at Raleigh, N. C., and a better Constitution for the money was never drafted.—*Boston Post*.

Unless the steamship Pacific, with nearly all on board, is one of those tragedies which curdle the blood. Among the officers supposed to have come down with the ill-fated craft is Mr. Howell, a brother-in-law of Jefferson Davis. We trust that the story told by the only known survivor is correct, and that the body of this officer has been recovered.

Ona Wood county, Pa., has in operation 34 factories, producing 9,310,000 pounds of cheese; Erie county 22 factories producing 9,610,000 pounds of cheese; Monroe and Vanango counties 11, producing 647,700 pounds of cheese; the aggregate in the four northwest counties of Pennsylvania is 101 factories, producing 9,657,700 pounds of cheese.

Three New York *Bulletins*, ordinarily impartial, protests against the heavy "burdens of taxation"—Federal, State, county and municipal—imposed upon the National banks, but says nothing about the prohibitory tax of ten per cent on the taxation of all other banks.

The law known as the Plimacall act, which was passed in the last session of the English Parliament, went into effect on the 1st of October. It will be interesting to shippers of produce to Europe to know that this law provides that no cargo of which more than one-third consists of any kind of grain, corn, rice, paddy, pulse, seeds, or nut kernels shall be carried on board any British ship unless it is contained in bags, sacks or barrels, or secured from shifting by boards, bulkheads or otherwise. Captains who permit the violation of the law are liable to a fine of £200.

The Chattanooga *Times* tells of a wonderful yield of corn on lands of Tom Oratchfield, late Congressman from Tennessee. The land is Tennessee river bottom, and the river overflowed, it is stated, laying a deep deposit of sediment. The corn was planted from the 20th of April to the 11th of May—rather late. An acre was measured 40 by 60 and the corn gathered on the 2d of October—yield 119 bushels. Another acre was gathered on the 21st of October, and the yield was 114 bushels. An average acre of his uplands gathered on the 22d of October, yielded 85 bushels, and another 58 bushels.

Prof. Becker, of the University of California, recently made an announcement which has made the business kings look a little nervous. These gentlemen have long insisted that the supply of silver ore in the bonanza mines of Virginia City is inexhaustible. Professor Becker states that the great Comstock vein has passed from its original condition of a mass of metallic silver into a condition of a mass of oxide of silver, which indicates, the scientist says, that the vein will soon cease to yield altogether.

Dr. Hunter McGuire sends to the Richmond Dispatch a long account of "Stonewall" Jackson's last words: "About half past five he was told that he had but two hours to live, and answered again feebly but firmly, 'Very good, it is all right. A few moments before he died he said, 'Order A. P. Hill to prepare for the funeral. Tell Maj. Hardee to stop, leaving the regiment unharmed. Presently a smile of ineffable sweetness spread itself over his pale face and then he said quietly, and with an expression as if of relief, 'Let us pass over the river and rest under the shade of the stars,' and then with out pain or the least struggle, his spirit passed."
