NEW JERSEY.

LOUISVILLE, Nov. 17.—The Ku Klux prisoners Owen and Smoot were taken to the Frankfort penitentiary today. Moffett has been repit d.

WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—A. C. Buell, indicted long ago for alleged criminal libel on Chandler, has been bailed in the sum of \$5,000.

PENNSYLVANIA.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 17.—In the Court of Common Pleas today, B. S. Hazard asks an injunction to restrain the Credit Mobilier from compromising the contract with the U. P. R. Co. Hazard claims that the whole scheme is to advance the interest of the road at the expense of the Credit Mobilier, and was fraudulent. A preliminary injunction was granted.

MARYLAND.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 17.—The monument of Edgar A. Poe was unveiled in the Westminster Church today. The preliminary ceremonies were held at the Western Female High School, where the initial movement took place Oct. 18, 1865, to devote some means to perpetuate the memory of the poet. The day was fine, and the vast hall crowded to overflowing. Several addresses were delivered, poems recited, and letters read, when the assemblage repaired to the church where Prof. Elliott unveiled the statue, placing on the head a chaplet of evergreens.

The steamer Geo. Leary was slightly damaged by a collision off Fort Henry with the schooner T. C. Worrall, which sunk immediately.

MISSOURI.

St. Louis, Nov. 17.—The following is the testimony in the McDonald case: McGreave testified: Had many conversations with McDonald about making money from evading the whiskey tax; he commenced operations in September, 1871; distillers brought money to McGreave's room Saturday afternoon, the amount aggregating usually \$8,500 per week, which McGreave divided into five packages—one for himself, one for McDonald, one for Joyce, and two for Leavenworth, with the understanding that Leavenworth should give one to McGreave; McDonald complained that Joyce took too much; McGreave then gave McDonald \$2,000 extra; the distillers retained about half the profits; I always set aside a portion for W. O. Avery, first \$100, then \$300 per week; Avery's increase was made at the instance of Joyce, who represented Avery as dissatisfied.

McGreave made \$50,000 or \$60,000 by the frauds, the most of which he lost by Wall street speculation; Walcott Thompson, distiller, testified: Paid Ring \$300 to \$1,500 per week—generally to McGreave; in September, 1872, Agent Brasher came from Washington; said he had caught us all; we gave him \$10,000.

Alfred Davis testified: Made "crooked" whiskey with the knowledge of Joyce and McDonald; paid from \$1,000 to \$3,000 per week; paid Brother \$3,000 as his share of the \$10,000; though his share paid \$75,000 to \$1,000,000 in fourteen months; was in Collector's office when the records

were destroyed; destruction was arranged by Joyce and Cason; Cason was chief clerk in the Collector's office.

Witness was here shown letters by Joyce, purporting to come from Avery and Babcock, the President's private secretary.

Witness resumed: Had conversation with McDonald about whiskey matters, who said everything was all right, go ahead.

FOREIGN.

ENGLAND.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—A telegram to here denies that Prince Frederick will visit the United States.

Biochon, Yagha & Co., iron producers, at Leeds, have been compelled, owing to the depression of trade, to discharge 3,000 hands.

TURKEY.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 17.—A severe encounter occurred on the 12th inst. at Fiva, in Bosnia, between Turkish troops and a large body of insurgents. Six battalions under Chefket Pacha were engaged. The insurgents were completely routed, leaving 600 killed on the field.

The evening papers of this city publish the text of the letter written by Don Carlos to King Alfonso. The attitude of President Grant, the letter says, is a prelude to war between Spain and the United States, if you do not recognize the independence of Cuba. The resolution which you represent is responsible for this paralytic rebellion. Had I reigned it would not have occurred, at least, not have gained strength. Now, however, the integrity of the country is at stake, and all her children are bound to defend it.

I should like to break out, I offer you a truce as long as the contest lasts, but maintain my right to the crown, as I retain the conviction that I shall one day wear it. I cannot send my loyal volunteers to Cuba, but I will defend these Provinces. The Caribbean coast will send out privateers manned by the indomitable population of that coast, which will pursue the merchant ships of our enemies, and perhaps chase them in their own harbors. If you accept the truce, let my appoint representatives to settle the conditions. If you refuse, the world will be the witness that Catholic Spain has nobly done her duty.
