IOWA.

Duquoin, Nov. 19.—The Iowa Lumber Co's mill, three miles from this city, was burned last night. Fully 2,000,000 feet of lumber were consumed. Loss \$65,000. The fire is still burning.

MARYLAND.

Baltimore, Nov. 19.—At a meeting of manufacturers of fertilizers a resolution was adopted, that fertilizers should be sold for cash or satisfactorily endorsed paper, and that barter for cotton and other products should be abandoned.

NEW YORK.

New York, Nov. 19.—The Directors of the Panama Railroad Company have resolved to proceed at once with their new line of steamers.
