WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The Secretary of the Treasury will mail his decision to Collectors of Customs to whom editors will apply for early copies. A sketch of Grant's message was read in the Cabinet to-day and approved.

Rear Admiral John J. Almy reports his arrival at La Paz, Mexico, on the 29th October. Health of officers and crew good.

The chief of the Bureau of Steam Engineering, regarding the eight hour law, says "this has had the effect of increasing the expenditures for labor, practically one-fourth for the same amount of work, and hence it has become cheaper to procure much of the work formerly executed at the Yards from private establishments."

The following is the report of the chief of the Secret Service Department of the Treasury, from October, 1874-214 arrests for counterfeiting and violations of the revenue and postal laws, &c., 83 were sent to the penitentiary, 18 are waiting the action of grand juries, 7 acquitted, and the balance turned over to State authorities and released on bail. The amount captured was \$20,886, with thirty counterfeit plates.

The respective friends of Kerr and Randall have about the same amount of confidence, though neither venture heavily on either. Heavy men in that line are here from Philadelphia and New York. There are some fifty members who remain non-committal. Randall's more sanguine friends claim his election on the first ballot, and he will almost certainly lead the field on the votes. If after a few ballots neither have been able to carry the caucus, Saylor, of Ohio, will come to the surface. He is popular as third choice.

The friends of Mr. Cox are warm and earnest, and will give him good adherence, but when they leave him, as they ultimately must, they will doubtless be the balance of power and will really control the organization. This is about all they hope to do. They give no sign as to their second choice.

Mrs. Banks, of Mississippi, is still the favorite among the prophets for Clerk, but encounters much opposition. He will probably poll his full strength on the first ballot. Adams, of Kentucky, and DeBoa, of Georgia, come next, with Wedderburn close up. Col. Tyler, of Alabama, is not without support outside of his own State. The other positions are not so closely canvassed. Col. J. M. Cavanaugh is making the race for Postmaster lively.

The first poll to-night stood—Randall, 7; field 10.

NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—O'Connor still remains in a precarious condition. At a meeting of the Board of Aldermen, yesterday, a petition was received from the United American Bricklayer's Association, asking for the passage of an ordinance authorizing their employment on the public works. It recited that the Association consisted of over 5,000 members, and that not more than one-fifth of their number were working; that they had passed through two seasons of idleness; that the present condition of business was such that many capitalists could not or would not employ them; that they seek labor; not charity; that they will not be able to sustain their families during the present winter, and that the city must therefore choose between furnishing them with charity or labor. The petition closed with the following sentence: "We know that by becoming obedient we can be assured of labor by the State or city, and we hope we will not be driven to that extremity."

Navigation on the Hudson north of Rondout is closed. The 3 power's jury have exonerated the captain and crew of the steamer Sunlight.

Nathan Sprague, colored, for two years employed in the Rochester Post-office, was arrested for robbing the mails. Fifteen letters were found in his possession.

MARYLAND.

Baltimore, Dec. 3.—Chas. S. Abell, son of A. S. Abell, proprietor of the Sun, is dead. He was a graduate of Georgetown College, and for several years a favorite contributor of the Sun.

FOREIGN.

BERLIN, Dec. 3.—It is reported that the conference between Bismarck and Gortschakoff and the three Powers which they represent, are in perfect harmony on the Eastern question.

FRANCE.

Paris, Dec. 3.—The Municipality of Paris has contributed \$6,000 towards a subscription to send a deputation of French workmen to the Centennial next year.

ENGLAND.

BERLIN, Dec. 3.—A dispatch from Penang of the 29th November, says a servant who was captured by the Malays at the time of the murder of Mr. Beroh, the English resident, has succeeded in making his escape and returning to the British headquarters. He reports that Maharanuh Lela is constructing a strong stockade for defence. The latter declares that the Malays will resist the English to the uttermost. Sir William Jervis is Governor of the Straits settlements. At Penang preparations for attacking the Malays are making rapid progress.

A Paris special says that the French Minister of Foreign Affairs states that the reason why the Government refused to purchase the Suez Canal shares when the property was tendered for sale to the Ministry, was that M. Mahon's Cabinet feared a war with Germany.

Col. Owen has resigned his position as the Centennial Commissioner, and Col. Herbert Sandford and Professor Arober, Director of the Edinburgh Museum, have been appointed Joint Commissioners.

A special telegram from Berlin contains the following details in regard to negotiations on the Turkish insurrection question: Count Udrassy, the Austrian Prime Minister, has submitted to St. Petersburg proposals he was entrusted to draft. In it he enumerates the reforms Turkey should pledge to the insurgents, and the guarantees the great Powers should guarantee for their fulfillment. Prince Bismarck and Gortschakoff have discussed the leading points of this document, and have expressed their approval thereof. As soon as the three Imperial governments definitely accept the proposals, the other Powers of Europe will be invited to participate.
