CONGRESS.

News from Washington—Proceeding in the Senate—Officers Nominated

NEWS IN GENERAL.

Investigation into Dorsey's Election—A Drunken Man Fatally Strikes His Wife—Jury for the \$6,000. Tread Trial—The Richmond Whig Sold.

WASHINGTON.

Congressional.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9. SENATE.

Senator Cooper presented a memorial from the Methodist Episcopal Church South, asking compensation for losses at Richmond and Louisville during the war. West presented a letter from W. L. McMillan of that State, asking permission to withdraw his credentials as Senator elect from the State of Louisiana by the Meary Legislature. West sent to the Clerk's desk and had read a letter recently published by McMillan, giving his reasons for withdrawing his credentials. He submitted an order that the request for the withdrawal of the papers be granted, but objection was made by several Senators on the Democratic side and it was laid over.

Boyer introduced a bill authorizing the payment of duties on imports in legal tenders and national bank notes. It provides that from and after July 4th, 1876, duties on imports may be paid in legal tenders and National bank notes or coin at the option of the importer.

After the Executive session Senate adjourned to Monday.

Nominations—Chandler, Secretary of the Interior; Pierpont, Attorney-General; Merritt, Minister to Belgium; New, Treasurer; Burham, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury; Major Robert McKeely, Commissary General, with rank of Brigadier; Col. William McKee Dunn, Judge Advocate General, with rank of Brigadier. All revenue officers and postmasters who have been appointed during recess. No new nominations.

Confidential—Chandler, Pierpont, New, John C. Smith, Commissioner of Indian Affairs. The Attorney-General to-day sent a telegram to United States Attorney Dyer at St. Louis, saying that advice had reached him to the effect that special counsel Henderson had, in the course of the Avery trial, made an attack upon the President, and assuring the United States Attorney that the department will not continue to pay special counsel for his kind of service.

Gen. George B. Williams, formerly Deputy Commissioner of Internal Revenue, is at the Arlington, en route for Europe in the capacity of Commissioner of the Imperial Government of Japan to Europe. He is accompanied by two Japanese officers of rank, Mr. Toriwa and Mr. Miami. We understand the mission is to have reference to financial and commercial matters. Gen. Williams is accompanied by his wife.

OHIO.

CONGRESS, Dec. 9.—The Anti-Trust Bill Convention passed resolutions urging stringent legislation for their arrest and employment of banishment.

MISSOURI.

St. Louis, Dec. 9.—Robert C. Watt, a well known citizen, presents charges against Internal Revenue Supervisor Meyer. He charges him with guilty knowledge of frauds practiced by the Gas Company on the revenue.

ARKANSAS.

LETTER BOOK, Dec. 9.—The joint committee of investigation into Senator Dorsey's election, reported that they had examined a large number of witnesses without finding direct proof of bribery or corruption.

NEW YORK.

SYRACUSE, Dec. 9.—Thomas Rogers, white drunk, struck his wife fatally with a hammer and badly beat his daughter.

By agreement of the coroner, Judge Peabody and Samuel D. Babcock, instead of the county clerk, shall draw forty, from whom twelve jurors will be selected for the six million Tread trial.

VIRGINIA.

RICHMOND, Dec. 9.—The Richmond Whig has been purchased by Messrs. Wyatt M. Elliott & Co. and to-day made its appearance under new management. Gen. Elliott was for twenty years previous to and during the late war one of the proprietors of the Whig and its chief business manager. Nathaniel B. Meade, formerly editor of the Whig, and the present Chairman of the State Conservative Committee, will resume editorial control of the paper, with Messrs. A. P. Bennett, formerly of the Enquirer, and C. Manrice Smith, long connected with the Whig, as assistants. The new proprietors promise to use every proper effort to advance the great interests of the State and make the paper worthy of its past reputation by a firm adherence to principle and a well settled policy.

ILLINOIS.

CHICAGO, Dec. 9.—Gals. Sheridan, Hancock and Terry, comprising the Court of Inquiry appointed at the request of Gen. Babcock, to consider the question raised in the prosecution of whiskey cases at St. Louis as affecting his reputation, met at no 10 to-day and decided that the Court should hold an open session. Major Gardner, Recorder, stated that on account of lack of witnesses nothing could be done today, and the Court adjourned to noon to-morrow.

GEORGIA.

ATLANTA, Dec. 9.—The failure of West, Edwards & Co. is still the exciting topic. A. J. West and B. W. Beeson, two of the firm, were committed to jail this afternoon for contempt of court in refusing to deliver books, papers and evidence of indebtedness to the Receiver appointed yesterday by Judge Hopkins. Edwards escaped from failure to serve the order upon him.

FOREIGN.

ENGLAND.

LONDON, Dec. 9.—The Times commenting on the Message, says: "If Spain cannot suppress the Cuban rebellion, if the island must be half ruled while she holds it; if she will not put an end to that insurrection which is the main source of disturbance, it would be hard to expect the United States to let the work of devastation proceed unchecked merely out of regard to the nominal sovereignty of Spain. Spain is on trial. The limits of her power to restore order will be the limits of her rights."

GERMANY.

BERLIN, Dec. 9.—The National Liberals in Reichstag consent to the political clauses in the bill amending the penal code.
