### SUNDAY'S DISPATCHES.

#### WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—The President has recognized John DeBryn as Vice-Consul of the Netherlands at Savannah.

#### UTAH.

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 12.—At a meeting of Methodist ministers in this city, resolutions were adopted protesting against the action of Bishop Haven and the ministers of Boston, nominating Grant for a third term.

#### WISCONSIN.

MILWAUKEE, Dec. 12.—A verdict of guilty has been found against Barbock & Reynolds, rectifiers.

#### INDIANA.

RAMBO SPY, Dec. 12.—A young lawyer named Jetty, fatally shot Dr. J. C. Watson, an old and respectable citizen of this place, who forbid Jetty's attentions to his daughter.

#### MISSOURI.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 12.—Jas. G. Broadhead has accepted Henderson's place as leading lawyer in the whiskey ring prosecutions.

#### NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—A London special says the Message has been chiefly considered in determining the purpose of the Government concerning the complications in Cuba. It has outwardly removed the existing suspicion that trouble was impending. It has also relieved American bonds from a pressure and a heaviness that was felt by those who are engaged in their manipulation. It may be added however, that these securities are still feverishly held, because of the suggestions of the President concerning the school question, and the opening of the new political issues. On the whole the Message has been well received, and especially that portion which treats of the finances of the Government, and the possibility, that at a not distant day, the currency of the country will be returned to a basis that will compare with that of other specie paying nations.

### MONDAY'S DISPATCHES.

#### MISSOURI.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 13.—Mr. Glover, in conversation with a friend, said he was unwilling to succeed Henderson under the restraints imposed by Pierrepont's telegram removing Gen. Henderson; that he considered acceptance equivalent to failure of Grant's right to remove any one engaged in the prosecution for the slightest criticism upon the conduct of the President or his Cabinet. In short, that he regarded an acceptance, under the circumstances, as a concession of certain privileges which not only every attorney, but every man feels himself entitled to in this country.

#### VIRGINIA.

RICHMOND, Dec. 13.—In the caucus this morning considerable filibustering was carried on, during which three ballots were taken. The result in all three failed to indicate anything definite, as in each ballot different candidates were voted for—the highest vote ranging from fifty-one to fifty-four. After the disposition of various resolutions looking to the bringing of the conference down to real business, a resolution was adopted providing that all persons to be voted for should be placed in nomination, and the one receiving the lowest vote on each ballot to be dropped, and the person so dropped to be re-nominated only twice, and if any person be withdrawn after being nominated, he should be re-nominated only once. Under this ruling the following names were presented: Good, Letcher, Johnston, Smith, Stuart, Flourney, and Jno. W. Daniel, of Lynchburg; Robertson, of Albermarle; Sheffield, of Smyth; Coghill, of Amherst; Cochrane, of Augusta; Harris, of Rockingham; Tucker, of Rockingham. A recess was then taken.

#### PENNSYLVANIA.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 13.—Bishop Simpson has denied the statement that he had expressed an opinion on the subject of the third term. He deprecates any attempt to connect the Church with political nominations or elections.

### WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—Senate—Davis, of W. Va., submitted a resolution, citing the law requiring reports to be made to Congress annually of persons indebted to the Government, list of defaulters, amount of delinquency, &c., and calling upon the Secretary of the Treasury to inform the Senate why such reports have never been made.

The Republicans fought hard against immediate action. Sherman moving its reference to the Committee on Finance.

The Democrats returned several such resolutions, which were finally postponed until to-morrow.

On motion of Conover, the views of the Secretary was asked on the importance, practicability and probable cost of improving the channel at the mouth of Cumberland Sound, Fla.

Merrimon, of N. C., introduced a bill to repeal section 4716 of the Revised Statutes, which forbids the payment of certain pensions.

Referred to the Committee on Pensions.

To repeal so much of section 3,480 of the Revised Statutes, as forbids the payment of accounts, claims and demands therein named, and all laws and clauses of laws forbidding the payment thereof.

Referred to the Judiciary Committee.

The bill refers to claims or demands against the United States, which occurred or existed prior to the 13th day of January, 1861, in favor of any person who promoted, encouraged or in any manner sustained the late rebellion. It further authorizes the settlement of such claims and appropriating \$400,000 for that purpose.

West, of La., presented a memorial of 1,000 citizens of Louisiana, against the operation of the Little tariff bill in regard to wine.

Referred to Finance Committee.

Broadhead's commission as successor to Henderson, has been forwarded to St. Louis.

### MASSACHUSETTS.

BOSTON, Dec. 13.—The Convention to nominate what is known as the citizens' ticket for the municipal contest to-morrow, nominated P. C. Cobb, for mayor, with eight Republican and four Democratic aldermen.

### NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—Motion was made by the District-Attorney to forbid the recognizances of William M. Tweed in the various indictments found against him for conspiracy and forgery. Mr. Dudley Field represented Mr. Charles Devin, one of the bailmen, and when the latter was called on to produce Tweed, his counsel handed in an affidavit showing cause why recognizance should not be forfeited—setting forth that plaintiffs themselves made it impossible for the bondsmen to produce defendant, and after the recognizances were entered, plaintiffs took defendant out of the bondsmen's hands, and on civil suits turned him over to the sheriff. The District-Attorney argued that it was the duty of the Court to order a forfeiture, and also that the bonds were merely suspended by the imprisonment of Tweed on civil suits. The Court reserved its decision until Monday next.
