NEW JERSEY.

JAMESTOWN, Dec. 18.—There is eighteen inches of snow here.

GEORGIA.

AUGUSTA, Dec. 18.—Cas. D. Tilley, the wounded duellist, died last night. He was a native of Ireland.

WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—There are no developments in the whiskey cases out. Secretary Bristol and Senator Wilson have been in close conference to-day. The department gives no information as to what additional advices, if any, in its possession.

CALIFORNIA.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 18.—A dispatch from Carson City, says Thomas Bent was hanged by a Vigilante Committee yesterday. He was engaged in many cases of arson and robbery, and escaped imprisonment through the lack of legal evidence.

VIRGINIA.

RICHMOND, Dec. 18.—For some time past the proprietors here have been trying to get the Union printers in their employ to reduce their charges from 50 cents to 40 cents per 1,000 ems, but the effort so far has been unsuccessful. The Enquirer to-morrow takes the initial step, in the employment of non-Union printers.

TEXAS.

GALVESTON, Dec. 18.—The advices from Fort Clark, Texas, of yesterday's date, state that a party of Mexicans crossed the river below San Felipe and stole 800 head of cattle and 50 horses from Strickland & Slaughter. The citizens are raising companies and threatening to cross the river. Great excitement prevails. The citizens of San Felipe to-day called on the military authorities at Fort Clark for assistance.

MISSOURI.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 18.—Gen. Babcock has been sent for and is expected here to-day, to plead and have his case set. It will doubtless be set for the January term of the United States Circuit Court, and will come up after the cases of McKee and McGuire. The report circulated here that some important documents to be used against Babcock, have been purloined from the desk of the clerk of the U. S. Court, proves to be entirely unfounded.

LOUISIANA.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 18.—The steamer W. S. Pike, from Bayou Sara, with a full load of cotton, sugar and molasses, while lying at the wharf, was burned to the water's edge and sunk. A portion of this cargo can be saved in a damaged condition. Mr. Bunn, one of the clerks, with several of the crew are missing; others, including two passengers, were badly burned. The boat was insured for \$8,000, and cost six years ago, \$100,000, and insured for about \$50,000.

NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—A meeting of the bondholders of Alabama bonds was held here to-day. The committee appointed previous to the meeting, presented a voluminous report in relation to the direct debt which is stated at \$14,718,178; the total deduction from this amount is \$2,786,000, leaving a balance of \$12,032,178.

The committee propose that in relation to past interest up to January 1, 1875, the State give bonds payable in thirty years, interest to commence five years after date. It also proposed that on the direct debt, interest shall be paid at the rate of 3 per cent, for three years and 5 per cent, for twenty-seven years. This report shows that the resources of the State, if properly handled, are sufficient to very easily pay this amount on direct indebtedness. An Executive Committee of three were appointed to manage and to represent the interest of the bondholders before the Alabama Legislature. In an effort to receive a better compromise than that offered by the circular of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, it was resolved that 1 of 1 per cent, be charged on the bonds represented as an assessment to defray the expenses incurred by the committee.

Charles O'Connor is steadily improving.

It is proposed to organize a Centennial Legion for next year to be composed of one company of 100 members from each of the original States. The Old Guard will represent the State of New York and to them is assigned the duty of securing companies to represent New Jersey, Pennsylvania

and Delaware. Sigismund Kleinberger, C. Clinton, Clapp & Co., Samuel D. Wilson and Benj. Bennett have made the arrangements.

FOREIGN.
ENGLAND.

LONDON, Dec. 18.—Default has been made in the payment of the coupons of the Peruvian debt.

Hurst & Watson, the committee of the Eric bondholders in England, propose the following scheme to be carried out under the foreclosure by the committee of which Gen. Tilden is Chairman.

The plan proposes to give the bondholders voting power until the position of the undertaking is retrieved, and the reduction of fixed liabilities to a level with the net revenue, by reducing the onerous rent charges, and also by reducing engagements of interest on first and second mortgage bonds, as follows:

Holders of first mortgage bonds and of sterling six per cent bonds, shall receive mortgage bonds of the same class for interest at present rates, payable in gold at six per cent., and after 1880 seven per cent. The company shall be entitled to redeem prior to 1890, at 105.

Holders of second mortgage convertible bonds—two classes of sterling mortgage bonds, running ninety years, to be substituted for sixty-six per cent. of the prime rate, carrying interest at six per cent., and payable in bonds of the same class from the date of default until March, 1877, and thereafter in gold.

The dividend on preferred stock to be reduced to six per cent, assessments to be levied at the rate of \$3 in the \$100 on preferred stock, and \$6 in the \$100 on ordinary stock.
