CONNECTICUT.

New Haven, Dec. 22.—The Yale College Boat Club have withdrawn from the Rowing Association of American Colleges.

MARYLAND.

ANAPOLIS, Dec. 22.—The Court of Appeals has issued a writ of habeas corpus compelling the Governor to issue a commission to the Attorney-General. It also decides that the Governor has no authority to examine into the alleged election fraud.

WISCONSIN.

MILWAUKEE, Dec. 21.—In the U. S. Circuit Court yesterday, Burbach, convicted of conspiring to defraud the Revenue, was sentenced to eight months imprisonment, and a fine of \$2,000, and he the costs of the trial. Sentence has been suspended in the case of Reynolds, his partner.

NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Dec. 22.—A special dispatch from Texas says that S. Lippin, State Treasurer, Kansas, has been forced to resign the office of Gov. Osborn. Lippin is implicated in forgery where the State loses over \$30,000. The Republicans elect Lippin last week.

The libel suit Henry O. Bowen vs. The Brooklyn Ede, came up for trial this morning. Plaintiff's counsel stated that defendant had charged him (Bowen) with operating the Kidd Salvage Company and its fraudulent transactions, whereas he had nothing to do with it.

ILLINOIS.

CHICAGO, Dec. 22.—Babcock left here last night for Washington. Judge Knowles, of St. Louis, his counsel, held a consultation with Babcock yesterday evening, at which with him to Washington. Trial will begin in St. Louis on the 24th of January in the U. S. Circuit Court, before Judges Treat, of St. Louis, and Dillon, of Iowa.

The Directors of the Commercial Loan Company have decided to wind up their affairs. The cause is understood to be a personal disagreement, and not financial embarrassment. The Directors state, that the indebtedness, including capital stock, is \$650,000, with assets about the same. The suspension causes no comment.

PENNSYLVANIA.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 21.—At a meeting of the Presbyterian Ministers' Association, resolutions were adopted, instructing members of Presbyterial churches to prepare history of their churches, so as to try out the desire of the General Assembly, which appointed a committee to consider the propriety of the Church taking part in the Centennial anniversary. The Assembly has designated the first Sunday in July, 1876, as a day of praise and thanksgiving.

The President of the Centennial Board of Finance publishes a card this part of the cause of the recent excursion and entertainment held upon the Centennial Board Finance.

TEXAS.

GALVESTON, Dec. 1.—Advice from Eagle Pass state that 300 Comanche warriors are reported the Canon of San Rogers, 40 miles above Rimalis. It is thought that object of the gathering is to make into Texas. Dispatches from Fort Clark, state that a party of Mexicans as the river 12 below San Felipe, seized Pond's ranch, killing 3 men and capturing arms, horses, and 60 head of cattle. Companies of citizens are organizing to follow them. Maroon is anticipated.

The bodies of four persons were found burned on the prairie, two women, burned beyond recognition, pony, with a lady's side saddle, and a gun were found near by, men, who were seen riding miles from the spot, were supposed have done the shooting. SOUTH CAROLINA.

CHARLESTON, Dec. 22.—Governor Chamberlain has refused to issue the commissions of Whipper and ex-Gov. Moses, the obnoxious Judges elect, filing the following statement of his reasons:

"I decline to sign the commissions of W. J. Whipper and F. J. Moses, Jr., elected as Judges of the Circuit Court of this State by the General Assembly, on the 16th inst., for terms to begin Aug. 26th, 1876. By the Constitution of the State, the Judges of the Circuit Court are to be elected for terms of four years. By a series of adjudicated cases in the highest Court of the State, extending from 1821 to 1872, it has in my judgment been determined that officers elected under the provisions of the law, similar to this provision of the present Constitution, are entitled to hold their offices for the full term prescribed by the Constitution, or laws under which the election is held. It follows that as the terms of the present incumbents of the offices to which the above named persons claim to have been elected on the 16th inst. will not expire until after another general election of members of the General Assembly, the present General Assembly has not the right to elect their successors, while in some cases presenting legal questions it may not be required of the Governor to decline to issue commissions, the circumstances of the present case compel me to this course.

ITALY.

MADRID, Dec. 21.—Gen. Quesada and Campos have arrived at Saragosa and left for Navarre. Quidiz papers assert that Count Marfin has been arraigned. Valmaseda's resignation as Captain-General of Cuba, greatly embarrasses the Government. Gen. Jovellar will undoubtedly return to Cuba as Captain-General, but his appointment is not yet officially announced. This will leave Gen. Campos at the head of the Army.
