It is announced that Alexinatz has been evacuated but the fortreas is still held by ten battalions and is defended by powerful artillars.

General Tehernsyeff is now marching with the bulk of his army toward Kruzvatz. He has telegraphed to Belgrade for reinforcements and the Servian minister of war has ordered General Antitch to march to Kruzvatz with 1,200 men.
