First Annual Sermon at the Temple

of Israel. The 13th of February, 1876, Bev. Mr. Mendelsohn was elected by the congregation of the Temple of Israel to take charge of the synagogue recently built on the corner of Fourth and Market streets. Yesterday he preached his first annual sermon, and announced his reelection by the Jewish population of Wilmington to the position he has filled so creditably for nearly twelve months. A number of Gentiles were among the Hebrew worshippers in the Temple on Saturday. After the beau-tiful service, one of the chief attractions of which was the exquisite music, Mr. Mendelsohn delivered an able sermon in which he dwelt upon the duties of a teacher and preacher in Israel. He went back to the atcient days when the patriarch was priest and teacher of his family, he mentioned how and why the Levites were elevated by Jehovah to the priesthood, and following the path of proface and sacred history came to speak of the present epoch and of the office he now held. The discourse abounded in graceful, well rounded periods and in portions of it, he was really eloquent. Mr. Mendelsohn's delivery is excellent, his voice strong and stear, and his gestures are well timed and forcible. The slight foreign accent is not at all unpleasant, and he constructs re-
