THE ELECTION.

We surrender to-day our editorial columns to election news, State and National. Most of our readers have doubtless learned already, that our National ticket has been defeated by a "solid North," with the exception of New Jersey. We were not entirely unprepared for this result, the extraordinary efforts made by the republican party, with General Grant at its head, to inflame the passions and arouse the prejudices of the Northern people against the solid South, has been as we feared successful. Sectional animosity has borne its legitimate fruit. All other considerations have been as but "dust in the balance" when weighed against Southern influence in our national councils. The era of peace and reconciliation so devoutly wished for, by every true patriot, and which we had fondly hoped to see inaugurated by the election of the peerless Hancock, has been indefinitely postponed. The North and West have preferred to endorse bribery, perjury and the most gigantic fraud ever perpetrated upon the liberties of any people, to the elevation to the Presidency of one of their own bravest soldiers and ablest Statesmen, because he received the cordial support of the Southern people. It is not creditable to the intelligence and patriotism of the North and West and indicates a low state of morality calculated to awaken the gravest apprehensions for the future of this country.

Our State election has resulted as we anticipated in the election of the Hancock and English Electors by a handsome majority, and also our entire State ticket, and a majority of democratic members of the next Legislature. This result is highly gratifying, when we remember the extraordinary efforts made to divide and defeat the democratic party in this State. We regret that this attempt of the enemy was partially successful in a few counties, but our democratic friends throughout the State have fought a good fight and won a brilliant victory. All honor to the democracy of the "good-old North State," and her gallant sons. The ringing tones of her eloquent sons were heard from the Mountains to the Seashore, and the result of the election has proved the faithfulness and efficiency of their efforts. A grateful people should ever honor them for their patriotic labors, and be ready to reward them for their sacrifices and services.

From the partial and imperfect returns received, we give the following democratic majorities: Camden 53, Martin 100, Pamlico 275, Pitt 420, Wayne 108, Harnet 400, Chatham 500, Franklin 95, Johnston 400, Nash 100, Orange 500, Randolph 250, Guilford 500, Anson 600, Cabarrus 500, Catawba 1450, Mecklenburg 100, Union 800, Alexander 400, Iredell 700, Rowan 650, Buncombe 375, Burke 271, Republican majorities, Chowan 115, Pasquotank 579, Perquimans 255, Craven 1600, Edgecombe 1850, and Halifax 1000, Northampton 450, Cumberland 50, Granville 250, Wake 379, Eorsythe 28.

Vance, Armfield, Dowd, Scales, Cox, Latham and Shackelford are elected to Congress from their respective Districts. Hubbs republican is elected from this District. The N. C. delegation in the next Congress will be seven democrats and one republican.

The Washington Post in summing up the result of Tuesday's elections says: "Garfield is elected. General Grant is nominated for 1884. The fraud of 1876 is condoned. This decision comes from a tribunal from whose decree there is no appeal. It is not necessary to look for the cause of republican success. All the corporate capital of the United States is identified with that party. The national bank, the bondholders, the great lines of rail-way and thousands of protected monopolies, have been taught to be profitable experience that they may safely rely upon the republican party, for legislation in their behalf against the interest of the people. These corporations sway an immense voting. They influence the political action of a Million of Men, who would vote the democratic ticket left to their own inclinations."

We have seen no returns indicating whether the Constitutional Amendments have been adopted or rejected. We presume that the first, prohibiting the payment of the "Special Tax Bonds," has been adopted, the latter, in relation to the support of the Asylums, we hope has been defeated. Had it been generally understood, we are quite sure such would have been the result.

G. W. Blount, Esq., requests us to state that he was not a candidate for the Senate, and that his name was placed on the republican ticket without his knowledge or consent. It was generally known in Wilson last Friday that Mr. Blount had been endorsed by the Republicans. On Saturday a large crowd of people from Wilson and Nash counties attended the speaking in this place, and if Mr. Blount did not desire the nomination, he was peculiarly unfortunate in not having availed himself of so favorable an opportunity to correct the impression which had gone abroad. We are glad to learn however that Mr. Blount is now unwilling to be placed in so unfavorable a light before the people, and we will cheerfully accord him space in our columns to make an explanation of the matter over his own signature, which we think under the circumstances justice to himself demands.

OUR COUNTY ELECTION.

We publish elsewhere the full official vote of Wilson county. We must confess our disappointment at the result. We have never known the democracy of the county to be so divided, nor rarely have we ever seen the Republicans more united. Disaffected democrats, independent republicans, and negroes were thoroughly organized in their fight against the regular democracy and, under such circumstances there is really no cause for surprise that our candidates for sheriff and register of deeds were defeated. Only a few years ago Wilson was one of the banner democratic counties of the State, but the democratic majority for the presidential and State ticket is greatly decreased and now we have the mortification of seeing for the first time a negro elected to the office of constable in Wilson township. Democrats—white men—should heed this warning. If this is some of the fruits of independence, would it not be well for all white men to stop and consider before they engage in further strifes and dissensions. In union there is strength, but a divided democratic party must surely give way, sooner or later, to a triumphant republican party, with its long train of evils. It is not the election of independents that has done the people and the party any injury, but the effect they have had in the canvass by dividing the democratic vote and giving the radicals a chance to play their little game successfully.

LATEST ELECTION NEWS.

Harris and Battle, Democrats, are elected to the Senate from Wilson, Nash and Franklin, by 375 to 400 majority.

The democrats in this State have elected seven out of eight Congressmen—a gain of one—Kitchen, democrat is defeated in this district by 4000 to 5000 majority.

GREENE.

Lubey Harper, Democrat, elected Sheriff by 59 majority. Dr. W. C. Galloway, editor of the Snow Hill Advertiser, elected coroner. With these exceptions the whole Republican ticket is elected by a considerable decreased majority.

PITT.

Independents routed—whole democratic county ticket elected, Jarvis and Latham's majority 400 to 500.

WAYNE.

The entire Democratic National, State and county ticket, with the exception of Bachan, candidate for the legislature, are elected by majorities ranging from 107 to 350. Deans, republican, is elected to the legislature, over Person, independent, and Buchan democrat.

HALIFAX.

Whitaker, for the Senate and Day and Savage for the House, all democrats elected. Entire State and county ticket elected by 100 majority.

NASH.

The returns received thus far from Nash county indicate that Cockrell, independent, is reelected sheriff by 500 and J. J. Drake, independent, for register of deeds by 450 majority. Lindsay, democrat, is elected to the legislature by 75 to 125 majority. The rest of the democratic ticket is elected by 125 to 200 majority.

Latest from Raleigh.

Special to the ADVANCE. Returns scattering. Latham's elected to Congress in the 1st. District. Shackelford elected to Congress in the 3rd District. Majority for the State ticket cannot fall below eight thousand. Amanance and Orange carry the ticket. Gates gives 500 majority Yancy gives the Vance vote. Anson gives 650 majority. Cox elected to Congress in 4th District by good majority.

The outlook this (Thursday) evening is satisfactory for the democratic State ticket.

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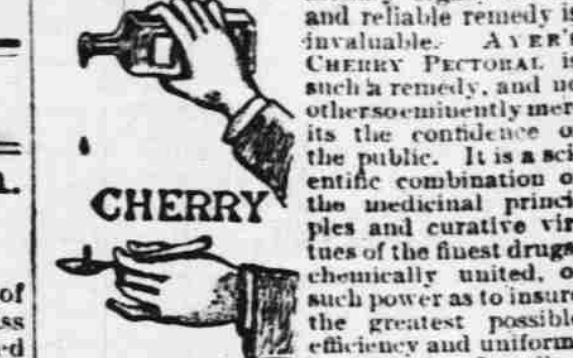
