Himself must either hold or drive."

What an old Farmer Says.

This is the advice of an old man who has tilled the soil for forty years:
"I am an old man, upwards of three score years, during two scores of which I have tilled the soil. I cannot say that I am now, but I have been rich, and have all that I need, do not owe a dollar, have given my children a good education, and when I am called away will leave them enough to keep the wolf from the door. My experience has taught me that:

1. One acre of land well prepared and well cultivated, produced more than two which received only the same amount of labor used on one.
2. One cow, horse, mule, sheep or hog well fed, is more profitable than two kept on the same amount necessary to keep one well.
3. One acre of clover or grass is worth more than two of cotton where no grass or clover is raised.
4. No farmer who buys oats, corn, wheat, fodder and hay, as a rule for ten years, can keep the sheriff away from the door in the end.
5. The farmer who never reads the papers and sneers at book farming and improvements, always has a leaky roof, poor stock, broken-down fences and complains of bad seasons.
6. The farmer who is above his business and insists it to another to manage, soon loses his business to attend to.
7. The farmer whose habitual beverage is cold water, is healthier, wealthier and wiser than he who does not refuse to drink.

Things that Pay.

It pays to have a garden, if you will take care of it; if you can't or won't do not attempt it. Perhaps a dozen of your neighbors are in the same fix; in which case you might club together and hire a gardener on the co-operative plan. If you make a garden, it pays to enrich the ground liberally. Nothing from nothing is one of nature's by-laws, if not a part of the constitution of things. Stable manure is adequate for nearly all purposes. The value of wood ashes, especially for potatoes, peas, early beans, etc., is also very great. It pays to withhold your seedling until your ground is dry and can be thoroughly pulverized, particularly for all root crops and for corn. It pays to sow your vegetables in long rows instead of the old-fashioned beds, and to use stakes and line in planting everything that your rows may be straight and even. It pays to rotate crops from one spot in the garden to another. When the ground is wormy it pays to use lime. It pays to kill a weed wherever and as soon as you see it.

If a little chlorid of lime be spread on the soil, rats, mice, and insects will at once desert it. Plants may be easily protected by it from insect plagues, by simply brushing over their stems with a solution of it. It has often been noticed that a patch which has been treated in this way remains free from grubs, while the unprotected beds round about are literally devastated. Fruit trees may be guarded from their attacks by attaching to the stems pieces of tow smeared with a mixture of chloride of lime and hog's lard. Ants and grubs already in possession will then rapidly vacate the position.

Raleigh, Nov. 9th, 1880.
Whereas, official information has been received at this Department that Edwin Farmer, late of the county of Wilson, and charged with murder, and whereas it appears that the said Edwin Farmer has fled the State, or so conceals himself that the ordinary process of law cannot be served upon him.
Now, therefore, I, Thomas J. Jarvis, Governor of the State of North Carolina, by virtue of authority in me vested by law, do issue this my proclamation, offering a reward of Two Hundred Dollars for the apprehension and delivery of the said Edwin Farmer to the Sheriff of Wilson county, a the Court House in Wilson, and I do enjoin all officers of the State and all good citizens to assist in bringing said criminal to justice.
