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THE SPECULATIVE MANIA.

To the calm and conscientious observer of passing events in this busy, bustling age, no sadder spectacle is perhaps presented, than that of the questionable means employed to make money—to grow rich rapidly.

Almost daily the press of the country furnishes us with melancholy instances of moral and financial wrecks, superinduced by this wide-spread speculative mania, which seems to have seized upon all classes of society.

In a shocking number of instances there is not simply a loss of money, but as events often prove, a loss of integrity—all that makes life desirable is offered up at the same questionable altar.

The fund for Mrs. Garfield and her children closed at \$360,345. Of this sum thirty men gave \$5,000 each, making \$150,000. Eighty-nine men gave \$1,000 each; five men gave \$2,500 apiece, and quite a number gave from \$50 to \$100 each.

A singular coincidence in the action of Congress with reference to a monument at Yorktown has taken place. Of course it was never done, and on the hundredth year after, it passed another resolution to do the same thing, but this time it appropriated \$149,000 for the purpose.

The Western North Carolina railroad is rapidly approaching completion, and is now in sight of the Warm Springs in Madison county. When it reaches that point, Dr. Howerton, the proprietor of the elegant mountain hotel at that place proposes to give a big blow-out, and a grand display of fire-works with electric light accompaniments.

JUDGE TOURGEE'S "FOOL'S ERRAND" has been dramatized, and was brought out upon the stage for the first time in Philadelphia last week. A few North Carolina republicans were present, and among them we notice the names of Messrs. John Nichols, Postmaster at Raleigh, and A. W. Shaffer, late Register in Bankruptcy.

St. Louis, it is said, is completely overrun with freights. Some 5,000 car loads of merchandise fill the tracks of Eastern roads, for forty miles out of the city, and goods shipped from Eastern points forty days ago have not yet arrived. The Western trade this season is stupendous.
