VANCE'S SPEECH.

The North Carolina Senator was, as
 usual, entertaining, his speech being
 full of sarcastic allusions to the Re-
 publican party for its advocacy of
 protection, and abounding in ridicule
 of that protection-needing infant,
 American manufactures.
 In the middle of his speech Mr. Vance
 was interrupted by Mr. Morrill, who
 wanted to know if the Senator from
 North Carolina did not in 1860, as one
 of the South American party, vote for
 a tariff bill. To this Mr. Vance re-
 plied: "I don't know. I know that
 in my younger days I kept some
 mighty bad company." He presented
 many figures in support of his ar-
 gument, and most vehemently de-
 nounced the existing tariff as oppres-
 sive, prohibitory and unconstitutional.
 His speech was very amusing, espe-
 cially when he came to describe the
 infant American industry, which he
 said was weaker now, at one hundred
 years of age, than it was at birth, a
 perfect *enfant terrible*, becoming weak-
 er as it became larger. Likening it to
 Aunt Jemima's plaster, he said,
 "The more you try to pull it off the
 more it sticks the faster." It had de-
 veloped an enormous abnormal
 growth, and was now entitled to be
 regarded with its insatiable appetite
 for more protection, as politico-econ-
 omical tape-worm. Mr. Vance
 touched his best point when he allu-
 ded to the Southern manufacturers as
 feeling the oppression of the tariff in
 their efforts to develop their resources.
 The protected infant was afraid of a
 new infant in the family. In North
 Carolina they wanted to build some
 factories, and they were desirous of
 getting their machinery without pay-
 ing a burdensome duty. Pennsylvania
 objected, and North Carolina must
 struggle along without protection for
 her enterprises. Mr. Vance ridiculed
 the recent tariff convention in New
 York as the meeting of selfish pro-
 tected manufacturers, referring to one
 of the speakers, an iron man of Penn-
 sylvania, who preferred that a com-
 mission composed of men selected by
 manufacturers should revise the tariff,
 as being "a friend of infantile ferru-
 ginous swine," which was accepted
 with laughter by the Senators as a
 very humorous term for protected
 pig-iron. He favored the abolition of
 internal revenue taxation, believing
 that the Government could raise suf-
 ficient revenue without thus interfer-
 ing with the States and thus depriving
 them of the opportunity to tax their
 citizens for internal improvements.

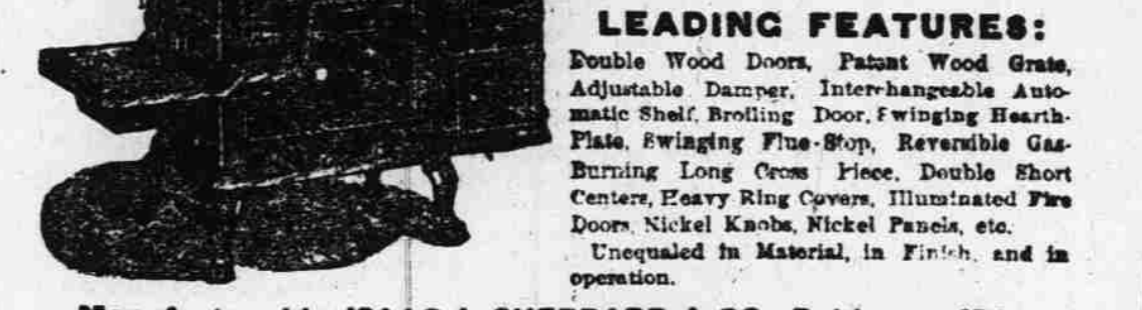
