Pursuit was made almost immediately and the negro arrested and placed in jail. No cause has been assigned for the deed. The woman was alive this morning and may possibly recover.

Our sprightly contemporary, the Siftings, is urging the formation of a fire company. As we have said time and again the growing interests of our town demands that we have some means of fighting fire, and we hope the day is not far distant when Wilson can boast of an active fire company unsurpassed in the State.

Fire at Goldsboro. On Thursday night Goldsboro suffered from a fire which burned two brick buildings on West Centre street, owned by Mr. E. Borden, and occupied by Messrs B. Royal, A. Korb and by Mr. J. M. Dodson of a Photograph Gallery. Mr. Borden had \$4,000 insurance on the stores, and Mr. Korb \$2,500 on his stock of furniture. Mr. Royal had no insurance but saved a quantity of his goods, while Mr. Dodson who had no insurance lost his whole outfit. We glean the above from the Messenger.

A Merited Comment. The News-Observer whose opinion in regard to graded schools had been highly estimated by the Wilson School Board, "the impulse which the cause of education has received of late finds a splendid illustration in the interest shown by the people of Wilson in their graded school. The number of pupils has already increased, the total enrollment being 375, and oftentimes only one pupil being absent. The percentage of attendance during the past two weeks has been over 98 per cent. Not only is the school a benefit to Wilson, but pupils from twelve counties attend, and some families have moved to Wilson merely because of the educational advantages offered by the school. Two thousand four hundred and forty-nine visits have been made during the last three months, and ninety-eight came to look in upon it one day last week. It has had visits from persons residing in thirty counties and from one hundred and seven teachers of other schools. Truly, it seems that Prof. Tomlinson has stirred up an interest in his school that must be of great benefit."
