The Biggest Gun Ever Made.

BALTIMORE, March, 18 .- After a tempestuous voyage across the North 6th, 1893. steamship Longueil arrived off Sparrow's point at noon today. The cargo comprises exclusively war material. The chief article is the big 124-ton cannon built expressly for the exhibit. The piece of ordinance is the largest ever made in the world. The calibre of the gun is 191/2 inches. The projectiles fired from it weigh 2,600 pounds and are 4 feet long. 
