Progress of the South.

The value of improved implements, apparatus, and processes in the dairy and other farm work is shown most conspicuously in the advance of butter-making in the South. Previously to the introduction of the deep cold setting of the milk in the closed tanks, and of the use of ice, there was very little butter made in the South or sale, and none of a fine quality for the best class of consumers. But now there are fine dairies scattered everywhere, and in spite of the summer heat the butter-making goes on as well and as easily, and even more profitably than in the

North. There are advantages in the South that are not enjoyed by the Northern dairyman. These are the ample Winter pasturage, the great diversity of feeding crops, along with the mild tion. winter weather, in which hand feeding is reduced to a minimum or wholly done away with. There is not one day in the year south of the old Mason and Dixon line in which there is any difficulty met with in the whole work of the dairy. And this mountain region in the South that extends from Virginia to Alabama, and is sixty miles in width or more. This region is from 2,500 to 4,000 feet above sea level, above the influence of troublesome germs, has a fertile soil, myriads of cold sparkling springs, is productive of the finest grasses, has 80 per cent, of its surface covered by the finest forests, in which cattle and sheep find even richer pasture than in the verdant meadows, and it has an even climate. varying from a few degrees below freezing point in the few cold days of the winter, but never one day in which snow will not melt in the daylight hours, up to the rare maximum but with always agreeably cool nights. tree.
