WEEK IN THE SOUTH

The Fair Forger Who Worked Her Schemes in Atlanta.

LYNCHED IN THE PALMETTO STATE.

Lead Deposit in Alabama—Wanted in Carolina—Kitty Cheatham to Wed. Young Men Are Tied—Other Southern News.

ATLANTA, June 4.—The merchants who were so cleverly taken in by the flashy-dressed, bejeweled Mrs. E. R. White, of the country at large, called on Chief Constable and arrested a reward of \$25 for her and put up money to defray the expenses of circulars and correspondence.

Mrs. White has been away from Atlanta more than a week.

The heaviest losers are the Keely Company, Eds-Neal Company and J. Edgstein. The female dupes stopped at the Aragon and went in fine style. She purchased bills of goods from her victims and gave in exchange checks bearing the forged signature of a wealthy Floridian and drawn on a Jacksonville bank. It is said that she had made a accomplice when she was here.

She remained in Atlanta but a short time and it is believed that after leaving here she went to Texas. However, this is mere conjecture. She covered her tracks with characteristic shrewdness and it will not be easy to find her.

ANOTHER PALMETTO LYNCHING.

Hardy Gill, Negro Plend, Taken from the Charleston Jail and Strung to a Tree.

CHARLESTON, S. C., June 4.—Hardy Gill, a colored man was taken by force from the jail in Lancaster yesterday morning between 1 and 2 o'clock by a party of twenty-five men and carried away about three miles and lynched.

Coroners inquest was held over his body and the jury returned a verdict that he was shot to death by parties unknown. Two or three days ago, he without provocation, assaulted and inflicted, it is feared, mortal wounds on the wife of Mr. James A. Clark, who is now at the point of death.

Mrs. Clark resides with her husband about fourteen miles from the court house. The whole transaction is very sad and is greatly to be deplored.

LOOKING FOR LYNCHERS.

The Mob in Mississippi Who Strung up the Burglars Eagerly Sought After.

JACKSON, Miss., June 4.—The press of this county unites in its condemnation of the recent lynching of the two negroes charged with burglary, near Clanton.

At the closing of the commencement exercises of Mississippi college at Clanton, resolutions denouncing this lynching in unmeasured terms were enthusiastically supported by eminent divines and other leading citizens, and were adopted by a rising vote.

The governor has offered a reward of \$250 for each one of the lynchers, payable upon conviction. The Richmond Gazette urges the grand jury, which meets soon, to probe the matter to the bottom.

One Found on the Property of an Extremist.

WIDOW LADY.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., June 4.—A valuable find of lead has been made in Dallas county, near Selma, on a plantation owned by a Mrs. Smith, a widow lady. For years it has been found impossible to plant a large portion of the land, the ground being tough and evidently full of some mineral. A few days ago some of the earth was carried to Selma and turned over to a chemist for analysis. After a thorough examination he declared the specimen contained 85 per cent. of lead of the finest quality.

As the ore alone is in enormous quantities on Mrs. Smith's place, that estimable woman is believed to be on the road to big fortune.

Bold Young Burglar Arrested and Held at Bristol.

BRISTOL, Tenn., June 4.—Will Cannon, a notorious burglar 22 years of age was arrested here last evening by chief Caldwell. Cannon from Mossy Creek pursued officers through several counties during the week and evaded him twice, but each time he cunningly escaped. He served a term in the penitentiary for horse stealing. He is wanted at several points in East Tennessee and North Carolina, for burglary. He admitted several burglaries while the officers were on his trail. He is wanted at Mossy Creek for stealing a lady's watch.

KITTY CHEATHAM TO WED.

The Nashville Actress to Marry an English Cotton Merchant.

NASHVILLE, June 4.—Miss Kitty Cheatham, the actress, will be married on June 9, in this city to Wm. B. Thompson, of England. The ceremony will be performed at the residence of Thomas Plater, Vanhail place.

Mr. Thompson met Miss Cheatham while she was with the Daly company on its English tour. He is a member of a large cotton firm in Liverpool, which has a branch house in New Orleans, of which he has recently taken charge.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., June 4.—Whichever way the dice falls, Alabama is destined to have the youngest attorney general in the United States after the August election. Neither Mr. W. C. WEEK IN WASHINGTON

Programme for the Coming Few Days in Both Branches.

FIGHTING ON THE TARIFF BILL FORCED

Bank Tax Debate Still on in the House, And no End Yet Spied—Trojan Horse Embarrassingly Springs up in the Senate Chamber.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The end of the debate on the bill to repeal the law taxing the issues of state and other banks and associations is not yet in sight in the house, although an effort will be made today to draw it to a close. It has been the desire of Speaker Crisp and other democratic leaders, especially those interested in the management of the appropriation bills, that today should see the close of the general debate on the bill and there has been the work of bringing in an order from the committee on rule to that effect. But that has been opposed by the republicans, who want the debate to exhaust itself and by a number of democrats, of whom Messrs. Rayner of Maryland and Harter of Ohio are types. The former opposes repeal and the latter favors it, but both agree that discussion should proceed two weeks at least, as in their opinion that period of time could be profitably spent in consideration of the subject. That the time would be occupied is proved by the length of the list of those who have spoken. Chairman Richardson for time in which to speak. It is probable that the order referred to will be reported by the committee on rules during the day to test the question. If it shall be agreed to, the debate will continue until the repeal bill will pass; if it shall be defeated, the fate of the bill will be "talked to death." In that event the executors may consent to reduce the limit within which to perform that duty and end the matter within a day or two.

When the state bank tax bill shall have been disposed of, the Indian appropriation bill will be taken up. An unusually long discussion of its provisions is anticipated, because of the many radical changes Mr. Holman has introduced into the bill. Next in order, of general legislation, will be the general deficiency bill for the fiscal year ending the 30th instant, which will have been reported to the house in the meantime.

The Week in the Senate.

Two months of tariff debate have passed in the senate and the end is not yet within telescopic vision. Republican senators stated ten days ago that the close of this present week would find the sugar schedule still undisposed of. The time of the debate in connection with the facts elicited by the sugar investigation of the special committee as far as that investigation has proceeded, and the facts which it is expected will develop in the further sessions of that committee seem to make it possible that this threat may be verified. Some of the leaders on the republican side insist that the vote cannot be taken until the investigation into the allegations of improper influence to secure the adoption of that schedule has been disposed of. Several of the populist senators and also Mr. Till are in accord as favoring this view. The solid republican vote and the populists or most of them, it is expected, will rally to the support of Mr. Manderson's proposed amendment to "chain the country" on domestic sugar instead of paying an increased tax on the imported product. Mr. Harris, the chosen captain of the democratic cohorts on the tariff question has given fair notice of his intention to "chain the country" and to "chain the country" until the investigation into the allegations of improper influence to secure the adoption of that schedule has been disposed of.
