The Woman's Rescue League, the headquarters of which is Boston, and the general mission of which is—well, we really don't know what its general mission isn't—has at least come down to definiteness, and vindicated its existence. It has thrown out its rescuing drag net for the purpose of saving politics from the malign influence of bachelorism. The league has resolved that "the American bachelor politician shirks his duty to the human family when he fails to provide a home for some good woman before he engages in the profession of politics; that he is not to be trusted after he has entered a political arena, in which temptations surround him on all sides; that unfortunately, modern society has heretofore given the political bachelor too much latitude by ignoring his private life, and that, as far as practicable, a list of bachelor politicians who are aspirants for public offices be obtained in the States of Massachusetts and New York and formal protests be sent out against their election or reelection, by the Woman's Rescue League, on the ground that that they are ineligible to hold public office.

The farmers have been busy to the past week, saving fodder and hay, and very little tobacco is ready for market. At a very early date, though, expect full breaks.

Durham—Receipts are light this week. Farmers are very light this week. Farmers are very busy curing the crop and cannot come to market. Both old and new tobacco is offered in about equal quantities. In old it comprises mixtures of common and medium grades, about the last odds and ends from the barns. In new smokers and cutters and exports of the first priming cures are selling and to a good active demand. Prices are firm.
