RIPERS. There is a curious story about some native wines which are extensively advertused nowa-days, and have only recently been put upon the market. Dr. Underhill, the well-known grape-grower of Croton Point, died in 1871. Some of his heirs entertained temperance views of such extreme kind, that they were unwilling to allow the stock of wines then on hand to be sold or any more to be made. The grapes have sometimes been sent to market, and tometimes left to decay upon the vines. It is only now that the other heirs have succeeded in arranging for a settlement of the c im. and the sale of the wines on hand. Among these it a wine of the wines of 1804, described as a "Sweet Union Port," but suggesting the Imperial Tokay more than any other European wine, and being wholly unlike any other wine of American growth.
