### THE STATE CONVENTION.

The Democratic State Convention met in Raleigh on the 17th inst. It had been the intention of the State Executive Committee to hold the convention in Metropolitan Hall, but on Wednesday night it was manifested that no Hall could be found to hold the great number of delegates who had come to Raleigh from all portions of the State, and it was determined to hold the convention in Capitol Square and to that end a platform was raised, and seats prepared under the large oaks which adorn the grounds.

At the appointed hour Capt. Samuel A. Ashe, Chairman of the Executive Committee, called the delegates to order and nominated James E. Moore of Martin, as temporary chairman. Mr. Moore was unanimously elected, and addressed the convention in a short speech counselling good order.

The committee on permanent organization having been appointed retired and in a short while returned and through its chairman M. M. Gehee submitted the following report:

On Monday Hon. Mason L. Wiggins for Judge of the Fifth Judicial District made by the District Convention, was ratified by acclamation by the State Convention.

It was moved and the motion prevailed that the convention proceed to the election of delegates to the Crucial Convention and nominations being in order the names of several gentlemen were placed before the Convention. Before the call of the roll was begun, Capt. C. M. Cooke moved that the election of delegates be postponed and the nomination for Governor be made, carried.

The chair announced that nominations were in order and Col. T. C. Fuller placed in nomination Hon. Daniel G. Fowle. Col. H. C. Jones placed in nomination Thomas J. Jarvis. Mr. Branch, of Buxton, seconded the nomination of Judge Fowle, and Capt. W. H. Darr seconded Gov. Jarvis' nomination.

Hon. W. H. Darr placed in nomination Hon. Alfred M. Seales which was also seconded. The roll of candidates was then called and resulted as follows: Jarvis 675, 942; Fowle 433, 112; Seales 108; Davis 14.

Before the vote was announced Harnett, Halifax, Caldwell and Johnston counties in the order named changed their votes for Jarvis, solidly. Col. Fuller changed the vote of Wake to Jarvis, and moved that Jarvis' nomination be made unanimous which was carried with great cheering.

Jarvis in response to loud calls came from his office and addressed the Convention in a speech which was full of good sense and sound doctrine.

Judge Fowle was called for but not being on the ground a committee was appointed to invite him to address the Convention later.

Nominations for Lieutenant Governor were then made when Jas. L. Robinson, J. S. Carr, T. M. Holt, and Kerr Cradle were put in nomination. The vote stood on the first ballot Robinson 471, Carr 307, Holt 228, Cradle 114. Second ballot Robinson 746, Carr 338, Holt 53, Cradle 29. And Robinson was declared elected. Col. W. L. Saunders was nominated for Secretary of State by acclamation.

Dr. Worth was nominated by acclamation for Treasurer. Several gentlemen were placed in nomination for Attorney-General. Col. E. C. man received 869 votes and on motion his nomination was made unanimous.

The President then announced that Hon. Daniel G. Fowle was on the ground and would address the convention. Judge Fowle took the stand and for half an hour held the close attention of the vast crowd as he only could. It was a magnificent speech and had the true ring in it. We publish it elsewhere. The Convention then adjourned and at night met in Metropolitan Hall, the crowd being much smaller than during the day.

Capt. Octavius Cole put in nomination for Auditor Gen. W. P. Roberts. His speech was said by many to be the best of the day. E. L. Love, R. A. Shottwell, Rufus Amis, Jas. G. Barr, Thomas Sparrow, T. A. Nicholson of Irredell, W. A. Darden, were also nominated. Capt. Amis' name was withdrawn. Gen. Roberts was nominated on the first ballot.

J. C. Scarborough, Buckley, C. C. Dugger, C. H. Denison, N. B. Cobb, R. L.

Abramson, J. S. Hill, J. E. Dugger and Dr. John Wilson were nominated for Superintendent of Public Instruction. Mr. Scarborough was nominated on the first ballot and the nomination was made unanimous.
