The New York Herald in speaking of General Hancock, says: To emerge from a beaten campaign with a reputation as good as he started with is greater glory than could have been gained by an election to the Presidency.

Whatever may be said of the late political campaign in North Carolina, there is no one who will not say that Governor Jarvis, as the standard bearer of the Democratic party, has borne himself nobly. He has sought those points where the battle raged the hottest, and through-out his trying labors has never failed to come up to the demands of the party. He has fought the good fight, has deserved success and will enjoy it.—Charlotte Observer.

We do not believe any intelligent colored man in this county, laying aside party, is in his heart sorry at the turn affairs have taken in this county. We believe every one knows, that his interests, and those of the whole county, are in better hands, than they would have been, had the "old man and the two boys" been elected. They would have had no influence. They would have been in the minority, and their efforts, even if they had made any, would have had no weight. As it is our Representatives will work with the majority, and their influence will be felt, and we tell the colored people now, that their rights and our county are safer from injurious legislative action than it has been for twelve years.

We have been defeated in the National contest but we have saved the State; and what is still another cause of congratulation we have elected to the next Legislature three Democrats to fill the places of the former honored Sons of Halifax, whose seats in the Capitol have of late been occupied by men who brought shame and disgust to the good citizens of the county. For twelve long weary years has Halifax county been misrepresented by men ignorant of the courtesies of life, ignorant of the rudiments of education, ignorant of the usages of all well regulated assemblies; but now our people can again lift their heads and know that the disgrace has been wiped out. Even the ennobled people themselves have been lukewarm towards their Legislative candidates, and have helped them to retire to private life to the requirements of which they are most suited.

GEN. HANCOCK. The Herald correspondent relates the incidents on Governor's island shortly after the result of the election was announced, and thus speaks of General Hancock: "While in the early, or rather late, morning hours these scenes were taking place in the General's headquarters the General himself was sleeping soundly. As usual he was up bright and early yesterday morning. The morning papers lay on his table. The bright morning sun poured in a flood of golden light into the room. But those election figures—figures evidently from any tincture of mediocrity—presented with their startling aggregates a most gloomy contrast.

"Garfield has won the race," he said quietly. "It seems to be a complete democratic route."

ACCEPTING THE RESULT CALMLY. There was no agitation in his manner or speech. He accepted the result with the calm heroic philosophy with which those who knew him well anticipated he would. At the breakfast table the subject was hardly alluded to. He chatted with his family with the pleasant freedom that so eminently characterizes him, and collected with his grand children, the special pets of his household, with all his wonted abandon; not a lineament in his face revealed disappointed submission. He was his usual self—free, jovial and hearty.

THE SOUTH KEPT HER FAITH. AUGUSTA, GA., November 4.—The Chronicle and Constitutionalists save in reference to the election. "The South, at least, has the satisfaction of knowing that she kept her part of the bargain, and if the 'hero of Gettysburg' is not President it is not her fault. We think, too, that she has for the last time been led like a lamb to slaughter. Her experiments with loyal civilians and military heroes have not been propitious in the past, and the future holds out no hopes in that direction. What she will do in the future time must disclose. The South will be kept reasonably solid for her own protection and for preserving the balance of power after the next apportionment, when the political domain shifts from East to West. The tremendous problem now confronting the two parties and all sections is, will the administration of Mr. Garfield be, in case of a control of Congress, modeled up as that of Hayes or dictated by Grant and Coaking, with Zachariah Chandler's spirit as the inspiring goblin? Until we know the exact nature of that administration we remain in abeyance; meanwhile we may as well prepare for the worst, but hope for the best."

WHAT AND WHO DID IT?

The sectional issue elected Garfield. Who made the sectional issue? Roscoe Conkling. Who emphasized and pressed that issue in the campaign? Roscoe Conkling and Gen. Grant. Were they anxious from the beginning? By no means. Their zeal was kindled suddenly, some time after the nomination at Chicago. What is the explanation of this? Time will show. Undoubtedly such an arrangement was made as Conkling and Grant believed would increase Grant's chances for a Third Term. We may look for the development of the plot in the future.—New York Sun.

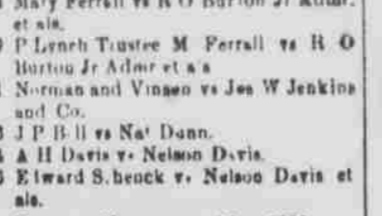
