THE EDWARDS ESTATE.

DOES NOT PROMISE VERY WELL.

The New Haven Palladium gives the result of some practical legal investigation into the genuineness of the supposed claim of the heirs of Robert Edwards to the tremendous property in New York. As the subject has created a considerable stir among North Carolina people directly or remotely concerned in the possibilities of a such a "find," we give the following from our New Haven contemporary:

"A thorough examination of all records has been made in the city of New York. It is found, first that no volume of records is missing; second, that no man named Robert Edwards gave a lease of property situated in the city of New York from the year 1750 to the year 1800. This demolishes the Edwards estate rumors. R. W. McNeil, a lawyer living at Hadden, O., was retained some months ago by the Ohio Edwards to look the matter up. Mr. McNeil has finished his work, which included examinations of records in the war department where he found that one Robert Edwards during the war of the revolution enlisted in the State of Pennsylvania, was taken prisoner, was paroled, enlisted from Virginia, and died in Ohio, aged one hundred and one years. The Ohio descendants of this man also have a tradition that he was formerly from Connecticut and had large possessions in the city of New York. Attorney McNeil recently called upon Mr. Daily after a most careful and thorough examination of all records, covering more than fifty years. He has found no record of Robert Edwards giving a lease to the British government or to any other lessee." This does not promise very well for the Edwards' syndicate.—New Bern Journal.
