KILLED AT A REVIVAL.

THE RESULT OF THE SUPERSTITION OF THE COLORED RACE.

Just before twelve o'clock last night a panic occurred in Harmony Baptist church (colored) during which one woman was killed and three others received fatal injuries. About twenty people were seriously crushed and bruised.

The church stands on West street near the outskirts of the city and an all night revival meeting was being held there. Suddenly the gas lights began to flicker owing to some defects in the pipes. The audience was made up of nearly five hundred negroes, all more or less under religious excitement. The weird flickering of the lights at once appealed to the worshippers as a supernatural visitation. A deacon arose to leave and the whole audience then arose to their feet. The lights went out entirely. One frenzied worshipper shouted "judgment! judgment!" at which the crowd became wild with fear. A great rush was made for the narrow doors. There were cries of "murder!" "fire!" and somebody yelled "dynamite!" Men, women and children were packed together like sardines in a small entry. The stronger ones trampled on the weak and rushed out over the prostrate bodies. Many jumped from the windows were injured in falling and by broken glass. The panic lasted fifteen or twenty minutes, and when the building was lighted up again more than a dozen people lay bruised and bleeding on the floor. Maggie Clark, aged fifteen, was dead, and at least three have fatal injuries. The accident attracted nearly 2,000 people to the neighborhood and quiet was not restored until morning. —Jacksonville (Fla.) Times.
