SELECTED SUPERINTENDENT OF HEALTH.—The sanitary board of Halifax county, composed of the board of county commissioners, Dr. John A. Collins, of Esfeld, and Dr. Winberry, of Scotland Neck, met at Halifax Monday and selected Dr. I. E. Green Superintendent of Health for the ensuing two years.

IMPROVED BOAT SERVICE.—There will be a change soon in the schedule and connections of the Weldon and Norfolk Steamboat Company. The company has arranged to connect at Edenton with the Suffolk and Carolina and the boats will run from Weldon to Edenton direct, which will do away with transfers at Hamilton, giving a much quicker, and a better boat service to the people of Weldon and others living along the river.

DEATH AT GARYSBURG.—Mr. Larry W. Joyner, son of Mr. W. T. Joyner, died at the home of his parents, in Garysburg, last Thursday night, aged 25 years.

He was a splendid young man and was stenographer for the Camp Lumber Co. at Franklin, Va. while there he contracted disease of the lungs and was given the best of medical attention, but could obtain no permanent relief and passed away as stated.

WATER POWER SOLD.—The Roanoke Navigation and Water Power Company together with its franchises, canal and improvements has been sold to Richmond and Norfolk capitalists, and the transfer will be made in a short time. Senator Cameron in the sale will retain all right and title to Bush Island.

The sale of this valuable property means great things for Weldon. We learn that the purchasers are all men of large means and that they will, just as soon as they get possession, arrange for several large manufacturing enterprises.

No particulars of the sale, price agreed upon or the names of interested parties have as yet been given out. Major J. W. Wilson, who has been managing the property for years merely announces that the sale has been made, and that it will be a big thing for Weldon.

We have out-lying information that the purchasers are men who are interested in street railroads, and such being the case it is only a little time before Weldon and Roanoke Rapids will be connected by electric cars.

BRIDGE PETITION.—A large delegation of Weldon people were at Halifax Monday and appeared before the county board of commissioners in the interest of the proposed bridge over Roanoke river near this point.

Mr. T. C. Harrison presented a petition signed by leading business men and tax payers of Weldon township, asking the board to aid in the construction of the bridge, briefly stating the benefit it would be to the county to have this bridge over the river. He was followed by Senator E. L. Travis, Col. W. H. S. Burgwyn and Mayor J. T. Gooch, each in favor of the bridge. County Attorney D. Bell said he did not think the county could take stock in a toll bridge, but that the commissioners would have the legal right to make an appropriation for a free bridge over the Roanoke, just as they have to bridge other streams, but he advised that should the commissioners give the amount asked, \$3,000, that they issue bonds in exchange for the stock of the bridge company. Col. Burgwyn said that would be entirely satisfactory. The commissioners after giving patient hearing to each speaker, in turn, said they would allow the whole matter to go over until the first Monday in June, as they were not prepared to vote on the question at present.

DEATH AT HALIFAX.—Mr. James Litchford Ousby, Jr., died at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Ousby in Halifax at noon last Thursday after an illness of about two months. The immediate cause of his death was bronchitis, from which he had been a sufferer for several years.

Mr. Ousby was in his twenty-eighth year, a young man of sterling worth and character, and until two months ago held a responsible position with the Southern Weighing and Inspection Bureau in Petersburg, Va., which he gave up on account of his health, returning to his home at Halifax hoping to regain his health, and where every attention that mortal man could have was given him until his death.

His remains were laid to rest in the family plot near Halifax. Mr. Ousby leaves a father, mother and four sisters to mourn their loss. Mrs. R. P. Hervey and Mrs. W. H. Blackcoll, of Raleigh; Mrs. Geo. Cole, of Greenville, N. C.; Miss Reb Ousby, of Halifax, and other relatives among them the Litchfords of Raleigh. Their sympathies of all go out to the grief-stricken family.

CAROLINA SURPRISES GEORGETOWN.—The following is a condensed report of the game Saturday at Washington, D. C. between the baseball team of the University of North Carolina and Georgetown's strong aggregation, as taken from the Washington Post:

"After defeating all rivals in the South the sons of North Carolina came to Georgetown, yesterday, and what their ball players did to the local collegians is a tale of sadness to the Blue and Gray. After dragging the Georgetown colors on the ground for two hours or more, they hoisted their own blue and white flag on the staff, while they were declared the victors by the score of 13 to 4.

Not for six years have the Washington boys been beaten so decisively. There is no excuse Georgetown can make. The visitors played baseball; Georgetown did not. That tells the story.

Carolina played one of the finest games seen on Georgetown Field for many a year. The men kept their eye on the sphere all the time, and when it came to swatting the leather they were there with the triple-plated articles and delivered their goods. Their fielding was sensational.

Green, the visitors' twirler, looked easy when he first took his place in the box, the local boys soon finding the same to be true.

With the same support afforded him yesterday Green could pitch on forever and be victorious. He worked in three innings with his wily, two honors over the right field embankment, while the third was a single to left.

George C. Green, of Weldon N. C., who graduated with high honors at Georgetown, in 1901, and who is now studying law at the University of North Carolina, is Carolina's star twirler. He is a speedy and heady slobman and has done some wonderful things this season. Many Georgetown men and some of the players on the nine know George Green and they give him a royal reception here."

GREEN IS A HOT HUMMER.

PITCHES SUPERBLY, ALLOWING VIRGINIA ONLY THREE HITS—PITCHER, VIRGINIA'S STAR, WAXES HIM, THREATENING TO TUMBLE FROM HIS ORBIT.

Chapel Hill, N. C. April 29.—Special. Over one thousand spectators saw the University of North Carolina in a fast and snappy game administer a crushing defeat to the University of Virginia here this afternoon in the first game of the series for the Southern championship by the decisive score of 10 to 3.

A better day for the proper exhibition of the national game has seldom been seen, and the Carolina baseball terrors took advantage of the occasion.

Geo. C. Green, for Carolina, the old reliable, steady, calm, cool-headed at every stage of the contest, pitched a magnificent game, allowing Virginia only three scattering hits, the first one being made in sixth; while Pritchard, Virginia's star twirler, who has won all previous games, simply met his Waterloo, the Tar Heels getting six hits, slushing him off his delivery. The Tar Heels outplayed the Sore Backs in every respect, and it was evident after a few innings had been played that victory would go to the white and blue. Holt, Donnelly, Smathers, Cheshire, Green and Giles swatted the leather like madmen and were potent factors in swelling the magnitude of Virginia's defeat.
