Serviss, a noted writer on astromomical subjects, says that the comet is brightning every night, and that it will grow more interesting until it reaches its perihelion, the point nearest the sun, August 21.

The mills at Roapoke Rapids, we are informed, are making strenuous efforts to buy cotton and their buyer has been on the move looking for the staple. The Weldon mills still have a small supply on hand and can run right along, for the present. They have plenty of yarn and the knitting mill will not fall short of material but it is feared that it will be almost impossible to obtain lint cotton.
