### GREAT THOUGHTS.

THEY HAVE THE GIFT OF IMMORTAL YOUTH AND STRENGTH.

The influence of the law of action and reaction can be traced more clearly in those everyday human affairs which come under our individual observation than in the greater movements of mankind which are often imperfectly recorded. He may change the opinions and convictions of some and the course of the lives of others; he may even save a city from slaughter or make a state if his thought be really great, it may live through many ages, stirring generation after generation. The reason of moral effort may be prolonged; it may even gain force with time, indistinct its connection with some stupendous physical energy. The echo of a great physical convulsion dies quickly, but the echo of the words of Confucius and Buddha, of Plato, Seneca and Christ, still lives. The voice of Socrates before his judges kindles men whose ancestors were untamed savages when Socrates spoke. Buildings decay, monuments fall, rivers run dry, races decline, but a great thought suffers from no impairment or decrepitude; it has the gift of immortal youth and strength—From "Balance: The Fundamental Verity," by Orlando J.
