AT APPOMATTOX.

NORTH CAROLINA AND VIRGINIA MEET IN THE SPIRIT OF BROTHERHOOD TO UNVEIL THE MONUMENT.

Forty years ago, April 9th, 1865, General Lee surrendered at Appomattox Court House, Va.

Monday, the 10th, there was a notable gathering of North Carolinians and Virginians, the occasion being the unveiling of a monument to perpetuate the memory of the valor, endurance and patriotism of the sons of North Carolina in the war between the States.

The unveiling was characterized by simple but striking ceremonies.

The News and Observer Tuesday published a splendid edition with numerous illustrations, giving the history of the monument, the part North Carolina took in the war and many special features.

There was a splendid article by Captain W. T. Jenkins, of Aurelian Springs, in which he told of the last firing by a small squad of North Carolinians, fighting from the corner of a house on the field at Appomattox after the army of Northern Virginia ceased to exist, and thus it was that the inscription was adopted: "Last At Appomattox."

But all did their part nobly and well, and while the monument unveiled Monday is intended to perpetuate the valor and heroism of North Carolina troops, we would not pluck from Virginia's immortal crown one laurel she gained in the most courageous struggle the world has ever seen, but would suggest that our Virginia friends now erect a similar tablet upon the historic spot to perpetuate the valor and heroism of her sons who were also "Last At Appomattox."

State Callings.

AS GATHERED FROM OUR STATE EXCHANGES.

There will be no summer school for teachers at the University of North Carolina this summer.

Strawberries are beginning to ripen in eastern North Carolina and shipments will begin in a few days.

The local members of the North Carolina Trap Shooting Association are making arrangements for the annual interstate shoot which will take place in Durham, June 21-22.

The large barn at the Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville was burned Saturday night. Five mules and one horse were burned and a large amount of feed destroyed. The loss is about \$2,500.

John W. Aycock, of Goldsboro, is appointed State bank examiner by the corporation commission, succeeding John O. Ellington, who resigned last month in order to become the manager of the Bank of Fayetteville.

The trustees of the State University have accepted the offer of Mr. Andrew Carnegie to give \$50,000 for a library building at the University on condition that an additional \$50,000 be raised for an endowment for the library.

Raleigh is taking advantage of the new State vagrancy law to get rid of some gamblers. Warrants have been issued for several gamblers who followed no business and no means of support. Other towns might follow this example.

Mr. C. Markley, of Roanoke, has been awarded a contract for street improvements in Salisbury, the cost of which will be \$25,000 or more. The work of laying the sidewalks with vitrified brick is to begin immediately and the other street improvements will be made at the same time.

The plant of the Shaw Harroco Company, located one mile north of Charlotte, was totally destroyed by fire. The loss will reach \$25,000, fully covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is unknown. This is the third time the company has burned out in six years.

Kinston Free Press: We have been informed when Rev. S. B. Hunter, colored, heard that some had refused to be vaccinated read to his congregation 1st Peter, 2:13, and commented upon it showing that no one could be a Christian without being a law-abiding citizen, and that he trusted that every member of his charge would obey the law.

Fire at Rocky Mount, last week, destroyed dry kiln of the Tar River Lumber Co. The loss of machinery and lumber totals seventy-five thousand dollars. The insurance amounts to twenty-five thousand dollars. The fire spread to the Rocky Mount Ice Company's plant, whose loss in machinery and stock was thirty thousand dollars, which is largely covered by insurance. Several small tenement houses near by were burned.

A Salisbury special dated April 5th, says a violent tornado did great damage to Livingstone College, blowing down Ballard Hall sodatorium and the laundry. Two students in the printing shop, L. Hall and Ernest Robinson, were seriously injured. The loss is about \$7,500. Andrew Carnegie recently gave the institution \$12,500 for a library. Two churches were destroyed by the wind storm.
