State Callings.

AN OATHED FROM OUR STATE EX CHANGING.

The Greensboro Industrial News is threatened with a law suit for libel.

Windsor now has telephone connection with Lewiston, Kelford and Roxobel.

The grading of the Raleigh & Southport railroad has been completed to within six miles of Fayetteville.

There is a case in the Alamance court this session against the Southern railroad for running freight trains on Sunday.

A young man named Roy Welch is in jail at Lenoir for killing Cierro Sheehan. Both had been drinking and quarrelled over a game of cards.

Rev. A. J. McKelway will retire from the field of journalism and devote himself to the regulation of child labor in the cotton mills of the South.

Bishop J. W. Hood, of Fayetteville, one of the best known negroes in the South, was stricken with paralysis last week and is in a serious condition.

The congregation of the Christian Church at Rocky Mount, has purchased a lot on which they will build a handsome church.

C. W. Dewey, defuncting cashier of the Farmers' and Merchants' bank at New Bern, has entered on the service of his six years' sentence in the penitentiary.

C. W. Ward, a fugitive on the Southern Railway, whose home is in LaGrange is in jail, charged with raising a check given to him by the railroad authorities, from \$21.60 to \$71.50.

The State Auditor announces that of the 2,400 corporations in the State, all have paid the State tax except 86. If these delinquents do not pay by November 20th, the \$50 penalty will be imposed.

For mailing an indecent letter to a young lady in Lenoir county, Sam Scarborough, a young white man of Kinston, was sentenced by Judge Purnell at New Bern Federal court, to 18 months imprisonment.

J. K. Doughton, son of ex Lieutenant Governor R. A. Doughton, of Allegheny, has been appointed teller in the State Treasury Department to succeed A. H. Arrington, appointed private secretary to the Governor.

A telegram from Washington to the Winston Journal conveyed the news that the contract has been let for the Winston public building at \$47,000 and that the time limit for the completion of the structure was February 15, 1907.

Raleigh News and Observer: Prof. Harold Hume, North Carolina State Horticulturist, has been made editor of the Horticultural Department of the American Nat Journal, published at Petersburg.
