ELLIS HEIRS WIN OUT. - Attorney George C. Green, of Weldon, won a notable case in the Federal court at Raleigh, last week.

The suit was for the face value of a policy carried by the late John G. Ellis, of Garysburg, on his life. On the 14th of February, 1901, occurred the death of the insured. The premium on his insurance was due and he had mailed the money to the office but 12 hours before his death, and while yet in good health, his death occurring almost suddenly. The remittance reached the company 12 hours after the death occurred. This was the finding of the jury, but the company contended that the premium was not mailed them until after the death of the insured.

The wife of the insured had died and none of his five children was of age. There being no estate, no guardian was appointed and no administrator to the affairs of the deceased. No suit was entered for the insurance, therefore, until two of the children became of age, when they decided to take up the matter and fight it out in the courts.

The suit was brought in Halifax Superior court but was moved by the company to the Federal court. The jury returned a verdict for the plaintiffs giving them \$3,195.35. The suit was for \$3,000 and interest for the several years the money has been due.

The case was ably conducted by Mr. George C. Green for the plaintiffs and the defendants also had able counsel.
