THERE is not the usual hurrahing and adulation about the President's message. Upon currency, tariff, government by injunction and like great issues there is timidity, hesitation, postponement, doubt.

HENRY G. DAVIS, of West Virginia, aged 84, is soon to be married to Miss Maud Ashford, who has been working as a society reporter for a Washington paper. Davis is said to be worth \$50,000,000 and he was the Democratic candidate for vice-president in the last campaign. This is the time Maud was sensible enough not to kick.

JUSTICE David J. Brewer, of the U. S. Supreme court, made the following strong pronouncement in favor of the "Initiative and Referendum" in his recent New York speech. He said: "Despotism and mob are the two extremes of government. In the one the people have nothing to say, and in the other they have unrestrained voices. True democracy occupies the middle ground. The more constant and universal the voice of the people, the nearer the approach to ideal government."

The Republican National Committee met in Washington City Saturday and selected Chicago as the place for holding the next Republican National Convention and fixed June 16 as the date for its convening. The vote was: Chicago 32; Kansas City 17; Denver, 4.

Ex-Mayor Neff, of Kansas City, in presenting the claims of Missouri, said that President Roosevelt was the only man who could have carried the State in 1904, and added that while Fairbanks, Knox or Hughes might now get the full Republican vote, it would take a Roosevelt to get the Democratic vote, which he had obtained in the last election.
