SATURDAY IS THE DAY.

Not Long To Wait for the Great John Robinson Show.

Strange as it may appear, the average Weldon boy and girl will arise from their slumber Saturday several hours earlier than customary—and in most cases, without being called, at that. Trials and vicissitude bother him not, much the same as the proverbial "water on the duck's back." He has been in the circus business many years, and expects to be many more, he says. John Robinson's interests in this line are in good hands, for Josephs is known to be among the best.



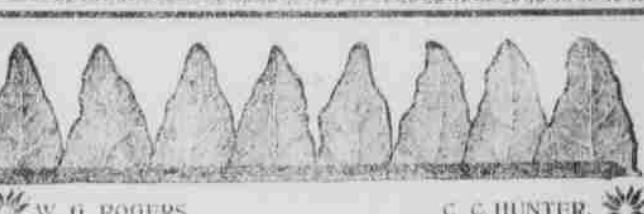
