Caldwell because they had been saucy to police when remonstrated with for their conduct. The Judge did not like the way in which they were dressed and proceeded to deliver himself as follows. What he says is so far as it concerns the way girls have of trying to attract attention by dress is quite timely, and applies not only to girls in Cincinnati but to those of other sections as well. Among other things Judge Caldwell said:

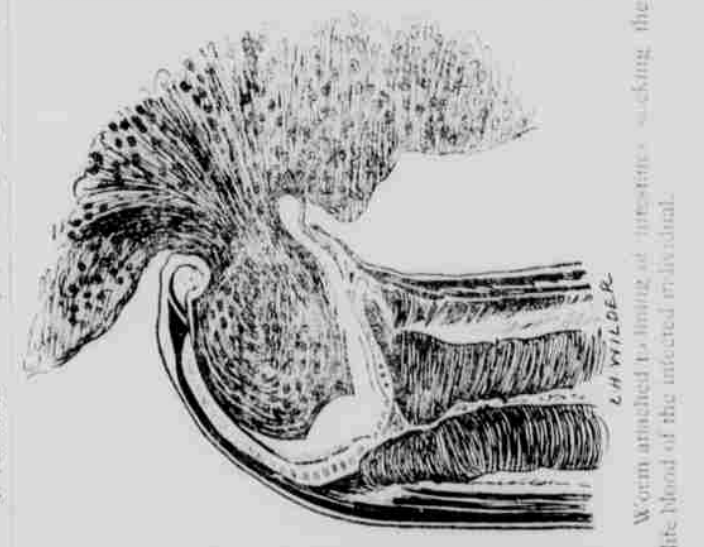

THE HOOKWORM DISEASE.

HISTORY. This disease is one of the most ancient in medical history. Moses, no doubt, knew of this disease, for while the Israelites were encamped in the wilderness, he enforced certain sanitary laws that, were they enforced today, they would absolutely prevent the spread of not only the Hookworm disease but Typhoid and Cholera as well. In fact, there has been discovered in Thebes, Egypt, a medical book, the oldest on record, written one hundred years before the birth of Moses, and in this book the hookworm disease is described. It has not been but a few years since it was first discovered and found to be so prevalent in America. Before this it was thought that this large body of weak, delicate and pale people were so because of conditions inherited at birth and could not be cured. Now, however, this is known not to be the case, that most of these people are so owing to the Hookworm disease and can be cured.

PREVALENCE. About one-third of the people, all classes, old and young, have this disease.

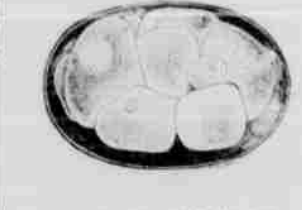
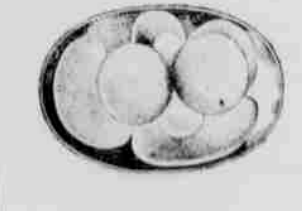
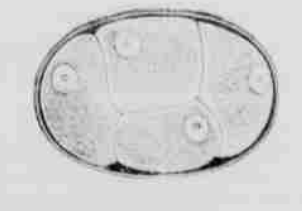
DISTRIBUTION. Found chiefly in warm climates where the heat, sunlight and oxygen produces a condition that rapidly hatches the eggs of this worm as they are deposited in the soil by those suffering with the disease. Cold kills them.

MODE OF ENTRANCE. About 90 per cent. of the cases begin as **INTO THE BODY.** ground itch, dew itch or toe itch as it is variously called. The worms burrow through the skin on the foot and, in doing so, produce an inflammation that gives rise to this condition. After penetrating the skin they get into the blood stream and are carried around to the upper part of the intestines, just below the stomach, which is their feeding grounds. Here they attach themselves to the lining of the intestines and begin to suck the life blood of the individual away. About 10 per cent. of the cases get into the body through contaminated drinking water, or by eating lettuce, strawberries and water cress that has been improperly washed.

SYMPTOMS. The majority of the cases, who have had the disease but a short while, have no noticeable symptoms. They constantly feel tired. Get up each morning feeling about as tired as on retiring the night before. Get out of breath easily and often suffer from stomach troubles. Others, more severe cases, have a pale complexion, hair and skin dry, palpitation of the heart and sometimes swelling of the feet and eyelids. Of course all degrees in modification of these symptoms may be seen.

METHODS OF DIAGNOSING THE DISEASE. Three methods; first, by the symptoms; 2nd, by a microscopic examination of the excreta in order to determine the presence of the eggs of the worms, and 3rd, by the benefit received from the treatment.
