## STATE CONVENTION.

Democratic Hosts Name a Winning Ticket.

### GLENN'S KEYNOTE SPEECH.

Fight Over Platform Containing Plank Commending Record of Congressional Delegation.

The State Democratic Convention met in Raleigh last Thursday and named the following State ticket:

Governor, Locke Craige, of Buncombe.

Lieutenant Governor, E. L. Daughtridge, of Edgecombe.

Secretary of State, J. Bryan Grimes, of Pitt.

Treasurer, B. R. Lacy, of Wake.

Attorney General, T. W. Bickett, of Franklin.

Commissioner of Labor and Printing, M. L. Shipman, of Henderson.

Commissioner of Agriculture, W. A. Graham, of Lincoln.

Auditor, W. P. Wood, of Randolph.

Superintendent of Public Instruction, J. Y. Joyner, of Guilford.

Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, W. A. Hoke, of Lincoln, and George H. Brown, of Beaufort.

Corporation Commissioner, short term, E. L. Travis, of Halifax.

Corporation Commissioner, long term, George P. Pell, of Forsyth.

Chairman of the executive committee called the convention to order at 12:30 and called upon Rev. Harry M. North, pastor of Edenton Street Methodist church, of Raleigh, to offer prayer, after which Mayor Johnson gave the delegates a most hearty welcome to the "Capital City."

Former Governor Glenn was named as temporary chairman and his keynote speech was one bristling with condemnation of the Republican party, its policies and leaders, and praise for the Democratic leaders.

The committee on organization recommended Francis D. Winston, of Bertie, as permanent chairman, and Walter Murphy, of Salisbury, and F. B. Arendell, of Raleigh, as permanent secretaries.

The name of Locke Craige, of Asheville, was placed before the convention for the office of Governor by Felix Alley, of Jackson county, known as the "Blue Ridge orator," in a beautifully worded speech. Several seconding speeches were given and with the mountain delegations yelling and making a great demonstration for their idol, Craige was named as Democratic choice for Governor of North Carolina by acclamation.

While the committee were gone to notify Craige of his nomination the following were nominated by acclamation:

Secretary of State, J. Bryan Grimes; Treasurer, B. R. Lacy; Auditor, W. P. Wood; Superintendent of Public Instruction, J. Y. Joyner; Insurance Commissioner, J. R. Young; Commissioner of Agriculture, W. A. Graham; Commissioner of Labor and Printing, M. L. Shipman; Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, George H. Brown and W. A. Hoke; Attorney General, T. W. Bickett.

Pandemonium broke loose when Mr. Glenn presented the nominee, Locke Craige, known as the "Little Giant of the Mountains."

For Lieutenant Governor the names of John G. Shaw, of Cumberland, E. L. Daughtridge, of Edgecombe, J. D. Boushall, of Wake, Walter E. Daniel, of Halifax, and E. F. McRae, of Robeson, were placed in nomination. The vote of Daniel increased until the third ballot when he lacked only 27 votes of being nominated.

Daughtridge was nominated on the 5th ballot.

The presiding officer recognized Cameron Morrison, of Charlotte, who read the platform declaring for an income tax, election of senators by direct vote, publication of campaign funds before and after election, enactment of laws to prevent corrupt elections, drainage laws, conservation, education, opposing trusts, monopolies, protection as a robbery, favoring equal taxation, revision and reduction of taxes, also commending the record of our Senators and Representatives in Congress.

A minority report was presented and a bitter fight followed, the minority report finally being defeated by a vote of 598 to 363.

For short term Corporation commissioner, the names of S. G. Daniel, of Warren, and E. L. Travis, of Halifax, and L. C. Bagwell, of Wake, were placed before the convention, Travis winning out on the first ballot.

George P. Pell was nominated for Corporation Commissioner for the long term.

The delegates at large to the National convention at Baltimore June 25th, are: Ex-Governor R. B. Glenn, W. C. Dowd, E. J. Justice, General Julian S. Carr, Major E. J. Hale, A. W. McLean, W. C. Hammer and Lieutenant-Governor W. C. Newland, Francis D. Winston and C. Ellis Gardner were chosen for electors at large.

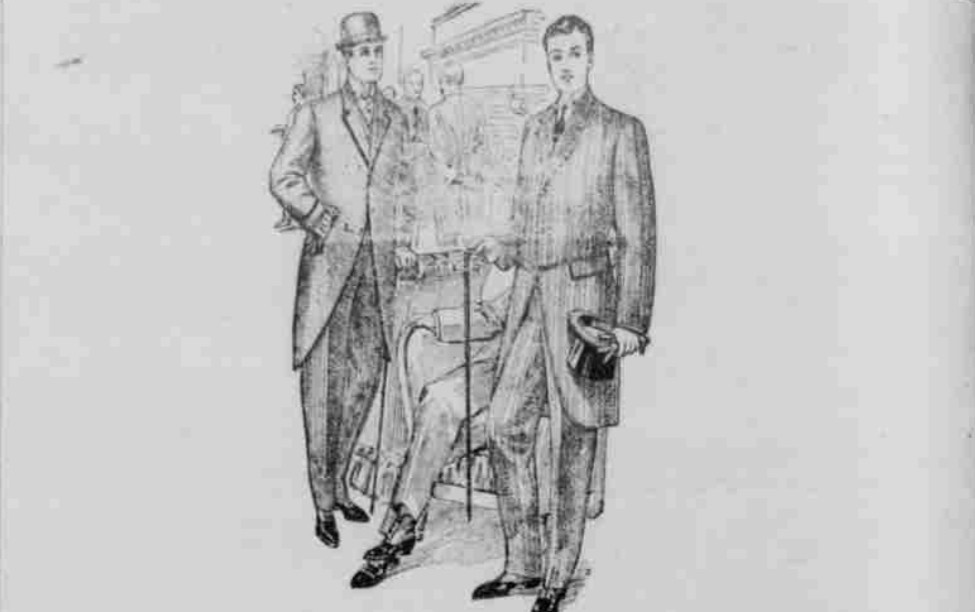
