SOAP, water, sunlight and fresh air are far more favorable in preventing the spread of infectious diseases than is disinfection by fumigation. This was the opinion expressed recently at the meeting of the American Public Health Association at Rochester, N. Y., by most of the health experts who took part in the discussion of the control of infectious diseases. It was declared that thorough cleaning with soap and water, fresh air and sunlight, and particularly renovation—re-painting, and re-papering—wherever needed were more efficient methods of disinfection than is fumigation.

FIRE AT CHOCKAYOTTE.



Paper Product Company's Plant Destroyed by Fire Sunday morning Building was Owned by Garrett & Company, of Norfolk.

HEAVY LOSS WITH SMALL INSURANCE.

Fire Sunday morning destroyed the entire plant of the Paper Product Company, at Chockayotte, and the building is a complete wreck.
Fire was discovered in the building Sunday morning, at 3 o'clock, and being located one mile west of Weldon the fire had made such headway before the arrival of the fire fighters that nothing could be saved.

The building was owned by Garrett & Co., of Norfolk, Va., and was erected about 20 years ago, and was occupied by Garrett & Co. for about ten years as a winery. Some years ago Garrett & Co. moved their plant to Norfolk, Va. About three or four years ago H. A. Edwards moved here from Roanoke Rapids, leased the building and operated it as a paper product company, making paper cones, spools, etc., for cotton mills, and at the time of the fire was doing a fine business and had orders ahead to keep the mill running night and day. H. V. Bounds and O. L. Smith were associated with Mr. Edwards in the enterprise. The loss falls quite heavily upon the members of the company. The total insurance carried on machinery and stock was about \$6,000. We learn that Mr. Garrett had no insurance on the building.

G. H. Kennedy had all of his household furniture stored in the building and lost everything. He had \$300 insurance on the furniture.

Mr. Edwards says he cannot properly estimate his loss at this time, but that the insurance was not over 40 cents on the dollar. Much sympathy is felt for the members of the firm in their loss. It is impossible for them to say yet what will be done as to rebuilding.

FIRE PREVENTION DAY.—Saturday, October 9th, is to be observed as fire prevention day in North Carolina.

Fully two-thirds of the three million dollar loss in this State is preventable according to Insurance Commissioner James R. Young, who has just issued a statement relative to the observance of Fire Prevention Day on October 9th. The statement of Mr. Young is accompanied by the proclamation of Governor Locke Craig setting aside this day, according to legislative enactment, for the study of means of preventing fires and the reduction of the fire waste. It is also accompanied by a letter from D. J. Y. Joyner, superintendent of public instruction, directed to the superintendents and teachers of the public schools of the State.

GOOD ROADS.

D. D. Winslow to Address Citizens of Halifax County at Halifax Monday, October 4th.

On October 4 at noon arrangements have been made for Mr. D. H. Winslow of the United States Department of Roads to address the members of the Good Roads Commission of this county and others at Halifax on the subject, "Maintenance of Roads."

Mr. Winslow is an expert in his line and has already accomplished splendid results in certain sections of this State organizing maintenance forces and directing these forces in the proper methods of maintaining different kinds of roads.
As a full attendance of the members of the Commission is desirable I ask you to let nothing interfere with your presence in Halifax on the date named, also ask that you bring with you, or cause to attend, all road foremen in your section of the county and any others who are interested in this, the most important feature of road work.

SOME CURIOUS OLD PAPERS.—A few days ago an old house, in which lived Miss Julia Parks away back nearly one hundred years ago, was torn down and some old papers were found, which are curiosities. These papers were sent to W. T. Parker, here who formerly lived in Northampton, Miss Parks having lived on a small estate adjoining the lands of Mr. Parker's father.
One of the papers is a circular letter, it being correspondence between citizens of Bertie county and Governor John Branch, of Enfield. In this article George B. Outlaw, I. S. Webb and others were urging Governor Branch to become a candidate for Congress, Second Congressional district, and Governor Branch's reply accepting the honor.

Another paper was dated July 5, 1822 issued by a justice of the peace to arrest Arthur Parks, security for John Parks and judgment was rendered in the sum of \$29.00 for debt.
A third paper was an itemized account dating from 1799 to 1802 of James Judkins, guardian of an orphan's fund, stated in pounds, shillings and pence, it being a final account rendered to the clerk of Northampton county. The writing is like copy plate.

BRING ON YOUR COTTON.—At a meeting of the business men and others interested in the advancement of Weldon Monday night arrangements were made to pay the farmers Roanoke Rapids prices for their cotton. George C. Green presided at the meeting and W. T. Whitehead and W. A. Pierce briefly stated the object of the call. A committee of three, composed of W. A. Pierce, R. S. Travis and J. J. Wyeche, was appointed to secure a cotton buyer and see that the farmers were paid full Roanoke Rapids prices for their cotton. This is not intended in any way to divert the trade of Roanoke Rapids to Weldon or to overbid that town on cotton. It is simply a plan to pay the same, putting Weldon on equal footing with that town, and to induce farmers living in this section to bring their cotton to Weldon. There is cotton enough for all and this town simply wants its share of the trade.
So, Mr. Farmer, you can use your judgment about coming to Weldon or going to Roanoke Rapids, as the price will be the same—no more, no less.
