THAT WAR EXISTS.

The 65th Congress of the United States organized Monday by electing Champ Clark Speaker of the House of Representatives.

President Wilson appeared before the joint session, and in a dispassionate speech urged Congress commemoration of the three hours to declare that a state of war now exists between the United States and Germany.

He recommends a full equipment of the Navy, and an army of at least 500,000 men and an additional increase of 500,000 men as
