A Large Number of Schools Throughout the County have Organized Community Life Clubs.

The Rural Schools of Halifax County are beginning an extensive campaign in Community Life Work. A large number of schools throughout the county have organized Community Life Clubs.

The purpose of these clubs is to provide better social life in the community, to bring about closer relations between the school and the people, to increase the loyalty among the student body, to induce more of the young people to come to school, to make the school life more interesting, and to create a greater interest in education of work.

Each school is properly organized and directed if it is possible to create, in every rural community, an admirable center for the fullest expression of the community life.

The first one teacher school in the county to take this forward step in organizing community life is Enfield No. 2, taught by Miss Dorcas Cherry.
