The American Red Cross has just prepared a Junior Membership with School Auxiliaries in which every pupil in the United States can find a chance to serve our country. This school is the natural center of your life. Through a year's best work in the great cause of freedom to which we have all pledged ourselves.

Your Junior Red Cross will bring to you opportunities of service to your community and to other communities all over the world and guide your service with high and religious ideals. It will teach you how to save in order that suffering children elsewhere may have the chance to live. It will teach you how to prepare some of the supplies which wounded soldiers and homeless families lack. It will send to you through the Red Cross Bureaus the clothing articles of relief and rescue. And best of all, more perfectly than through any of your school lessons, you will learn by doing things and things under your teacher's direction to be the future good citizens of this great country which we all love.

And I commend to all school teachers the simple plan which the American Red Cross has worked out to provide for your co-operation, knowing that by this means children will give their best service under the direct guidance and instruction of their teachers. Is not this perhaps the chance for which you have been looking to give your time and efforts in some measure to meet our national needs?
